MINON, Dec. 22.—This camp is making rapid strides. Home accommodations are meager. Several large buildings are in course of erection and will soon be opened for the traveling public. The First Bank of Minon is about ready for occupancy. It is next door to the Minon Hotel on Main street. The lower town is showing fast, this part is in the early stages.
