State Finally Gets Over Fifty Thousand Acres of Public Land.

Pursuant to the promise made by Secy, of the Interior Garfield to the Utah delegates at the Land convention in Denver recently, the state board of land commissioners has received notice of the approval of selections made by the board of more than 50,000 acres of public lands in this state. These are the first elections approved for two years and some of them have been hanging fire slace 1898. The lists approved are as follows:

List No. 11 comprises \$1.578.39 acres out of the grant to the state for Agricultural college purposes of 200,000 acres under section 8 of act of Congress approved July 18, 1804. This makes a total of lands selected under this grant of 163.826.08 acres.

List 18 is out of the grant to the state for the establishment of permanent res-Utah delegates at the Land convention

ervoirs for irrigating purposes of 500,000 acres, under section 12 of the same act. This list contains 19,322,88 acres.
List 19 is under the same section and our of the same 500,000 acre grant. It contains 20,697,25 acres, making an aggregate of 440,964,44 acres selected under this grant.
