# LOCAL BRIEFS.

Annual Meeting-The annualestock holders' meeting of the Utah Savings & Trust company, which has been ad-journed twice, is set for final session this afternoon.

Big Reward Offered—The Carbon County, (Wyo.), Wool Growers' as-sociation has offered a reward of \$1,000 for the arrest and conviction of the men who raided the Weber & Hatch sheep camp at Burnt Fork, Jan. 10, and killed A. H. Garside. This makes a total reward of \$2,500.

A Wyoming Quarantine—The Wyo-ming state board of sheep commission-erz has issued orders quarantining against Montana, Utah and Oregon, and ordering that all Wyoming sheep be examined for scab at the time of shearing. All sheep from the quar-antined states must be dipped twice and kept secluded for 30 days.

Free Social and Dance—This even-ing at 8 o'clock at Federation of Labor hall the Industrial Workers of the World will give their first free social and dance. There will be recitations, songs and music and refreshments will be served. Everything is free, says the committee, and everybody inter-ested in labor's cause is invited.

Must Obey Law-The city ordi-nance in relation to requiring milk dealers to display on their wagons the name and location of their dairy, and their license number, will be strictly enforced, according to the announce-ment made by City Food Inspector Frazier yesterday. Any violation of the ordinance is likely to lead to the arrest of the offender.

# Who Has Been Appointed by Governor Cutler to Succeed William Spry as Chairman of the State Land Board.

A dark horse, that is so far as the public was aware, secured the appointment on the state board of land commissioners yesterday afternoon, when Gov. Cutler appointed former Chief of Police William J. Lynch to succeed Chairman William Spry, who is now United States marshal for Utah. Mr. Lynch's appointment was a surprise to the general public as his name had never been mentioned in connection with the appointment by the press. His appointment was no doubt also a sur prise to the other candidates in the field.

Mr. Lynch has served the county as assessor and has been engaged in the real estate business in this city, so that he is well qualified to fill a position on the land board, as he is so well acquainted with real estate values. He was appointed chief of police by Mayor Thompson at the close of his former administration, and was retained in that position during Mayor Morris' administration. He was ousted when the American party took charge of the city on the first of January. During the last municipal campaign he headed the Republican ticket as a candidate for mayor, but was defeated.
