Record for August This Year Far Surpasses That of 1907.

On the building that is soon to ce Building permits for the month of ment Utah's business interests with August show a remarkable increase those of the entire west, and Salt over the permits issue for the same over the permits issue for the same month last year. In the report Building Inspector A, B, Hirth gives the number of permits issued for the month at 116, with an estimated value in buildings of \$338,500, as against 58 in August of 1907, with an estimated value of \$170,100. Most of the building done the past month has been in resi-dences, \$200,000 of the total value of permit grants being for structures costing less than \$5,000.
