

## TERRITORIAL NEWS.

Bare Salt Cracking Reported from  
Ogden.

The Ogden Standard says: Between 2 and 3 o'clock on Monday evening the salt of mine number 11 at the Washington was blown open and the salt under the counter piled open by miners. The salt in the till was not much of a haul for the miners, about a ton and a half was taken from the salt and it contained money; but in this they were disappointed, as there was nothing to it but salt. The miners, however, were unable to claim the owners, so no one else.

While two others were driving a mule team down the little hill behind the hotel hotel party advanced, one of the men taking the mule and the other taking the tongue to fall and the wagon to run up in the autumn. The mule started to run when the tongue was broken sharply around the axles behind the hotel it ran into some posts, throwing the ladies out. They were considerably shaken up but received no very severe injury.

Sheriff Feltner arrested a man named John H. Morris, of Salt Lake City, Friday, who is wanted at Ogden, Utah, for robbery. It appears that Feltner is a stage driver and a man accused him of robbing a mail coach with W. H. Feltner & Co. The inability to get away with the money was more than he could withstand, and he loaded a mule and started west. When he reached Ogden he left his gun in his possession. Utah officers will be at Battle Mountain today to take him back to trial.

**Zion's Savings Bank** — The bank that has fallen in Brigham for years, visited the upper town on the evening of Saturday, and it was a near relive to one. About 2 p.m. the citizens of central Brigham heard a mournful noise, and rushing out to learn what was the cause, coming down from the Highland country, with terrible force, a volume of water about half a mile deep and twelve feet high, logs, stumps, rocks, trees, wheelbarrows and camping outfit and bundles waving from city to low thousand yards. The water was about six or seven all gone down, leaving the street in the main part of the town looking like a rough creek bed, large boulders, logs, trash, etc., still floating down the stream. In several places where the flood washed over the sheaves and porches were left quite large deposited mud and other refuse items, which will be cleaned up later. The amount of damage from above is not known, but to the time of going to press (2 o'clock, p.m.) we have heard of no serious damage being done to property. The roads are badly cut.

**Zion's Savings Bank** — Lost Sunday a man, caused by flying sparks from a passenger locomotive, set fire to Joseph Merritt's stock yards south of town. Twenty-five tons of hay and considerable framing material were entirely destroyed. The total amount of the loss has not been ascertained, yet it is understood it runs pretty far up into the hundreds.

**Highway Robbery** — Last Saturday a party of robbers armed with a pistol and shotgun, had an exciting time in the mountains southwest of Brigham City with a large rattlesnake. They were taking single file up the trail, when suddenly they heard a noise that sounded like a rattlesnake, which when heard is never to be forgotten, was heard in a very low voice, and before they could even see it, apparently the snake changed its location and crawled down toward them. The gentlemen gave a cry of alarm as the only outlet shot directly at the snake, but it did not even mortally to death, turned and fled down the hill with the snake alone at their heels. As soon as these scoundrels could catch up with it, they overtook the fleeing party, and shot the snake full with a pistol shot. It then took to a hole, where, winding itself into a skein with a wire loop from a trusty old gun.

**Hooper Criminals** — There were bills of a prison being filed before the Utah commissioners, against the insurance of a certificate of election of Walter S. Tolson, as recorder for Wasatch County. The bill, if passed, will be that Tolson, we understand, will be held. Fetheringham was appointed by the county court to fill the unexpired term of C. G. Feltner, who died on August 10, 1890, for a two year term. Mr. Fetheringham was appointed during 1890, soon after the election of Mr. Harris, and since, was not elected to fill the unexpired term. Without entering into the unexpired term, without entering into the details, we will just say if the rumor is true, it will be the raising of a new kind of law here.
