TRIP CUT SHORT.

This step is the forerunner of the opening up of that section of Idaho. It is said that the prospect holes are developing ore that shows that even with the long haul to the railroad that there is money in mining. Just as soon as it has been demonstrated that these

fine prospects will not pinch out, but on the other hand are fine paying prop-ositions, just so soon will the iron horse invade that section, and if present indications hold good the first in the field will be the Oregon Short Line.
