



Sudden Ending of Life of John Davies Jr. Well Known Tailor.

### WAS BROKEN BY FALL.

Found is Gangway This Morning--No loquest Will be Held-Cause Of Death Too Plain.

John Davies, Jr., the tailor, was found dead this morning shortly before 7 o'clock at the bottom of the stairway leading to his shop in the basement of the Kenyon hotel on East Second South street. When found there by a passerby, he had probably been dead for several hours. His neck was broken in the fall. His features were considerably distorted and his face presented a horrible sight with flics swarming about it. His clothes were dirty and torn. Davies is said to have been addicted to drink, and there is but little doubt that he was in an intextcated condition when he fell down the stairway in his attempt

to enter his shop, where he slept. Davles is the son of John Davles of 177 L street, and a brother of Ed. Davies of the police force and of Henry payles, the plumber. He was unmarried, about 50 years of age, and a native of Wales. He had been in this tive of Wales. He had been in thia clip for many years, and was a famil-tar sight on the streets. He was a well known character, and was known as "Jack" Davies, the one-legged tailor. Soon after finding the remains, they were taken to the undertaking estab-lishment of Jos. E. Taylor. The cor-oner was notified, but members of the family have stated that no inquest would be necessary, as the cause of his death was too evident.
