**ALL VOTE.**

PUBLIC sentiment on the canal question is getting more settled. The ventilation of the subject has done good. The point at issue is sticking up sharply through all the fog and dust that have been thrown around it, and the people are beginning to see it apart from the theories of enthusiasts, the carping of chronic objectors and the private plans and "better methods" of people who always think that the way adopted is wrong. The point is, shall we empower the City Council to borrow money to bring more water into the city for the public good? That is all.

Everybody should vote on this question. It requires a two-thirds majority, remember. Therefore all who desire the growth, prosperity and increase of business, beauty and importance of Salt Lake City should vote "yes" and not leave the small minority, who will be out in force because opposition is ever active, to block the way to an important public improvement, in consequence of the apathy or indifference of the friends of the measure. **COLORED CANDY.**

In another column will be found a communication from a practical confectioner, on the subject of coloring matter in candy, the injurious effects of some of which we pointed out a few days ago. The letter contains some recipes recommended by a celebrated eastern confectioner, and in extensive use in the trade. It will be seen that in the most harmless of the preparations there is a quantity of alum; in others a solution of tin, or of green vitriol, also a quantity of sal ammoniac.

However minute the particles of these substances which enter into the composition of a piece of colored candy may be, we think no careful parent desires to buy such stuff for the children to eat. The fact that coloring solutions are concealed for sale and used by confectioners should be well understood, and the candy makers ought to learn something of the nature and effects of the ingredients with which they treat their goods. They may be unconsciously scattering the seeds of sickness and the germs of death, and while aiming to sell sweets, be unintentionally distributing grains of disease, and poisoning the delicate bodies of the little children.

We expressed our opinion in writing on this tinted poison and colored death, that some of our home candy makers have been using aniline for coloring matter, because it is cheap. We are informed that our suspicion was well founded. Also that similar adulterations to those adopted here East are not unknown in Utah. Inferior sugar is used, the impurities of which have been explained in the News. If the sugar of which candy is made is flavored with muskate of tin, and the matter with which it is colored contains more tin, besides alum, salts of tartar, etc., there is no wonder that children have been seriously injured by devouring such a mass of stuff under the name of candy.

We repeat our advice to those who buy sweets. Don't take any candy that is colored at all. Let the demand for the tinted adulteration cease and the supply will fall. Get the clear sugar-hued confectionery, or note "Who wants tartar alba in the form of white lozenges, say more than aniline, or a solution of tin, or a lot of alum in a pretty colored piece of fancy candy? A moderate quantity of pure candy made from good sugar, will not generally injure the little folks. But the lovely violet, rich cochineal, brilliant emerald or radiant rouge colored decoration, is painful, and in death disguised. Let the public stamp out the evil by rejecting the attractive but utterly useless deception, and thus save themselves from trouble and their darlings from sickness, suffering and perhaps fatal distress.

**THE "LETTER EXPRESS" DISPUTE.**

THE principal papers of the Pacific Coast have been showing up the errors into which the Commission has fallen, which was appointed by the Postmaster General to examine into the operations and effect of the "letter express" business of Wells, Fargo & Co.; and the great benefit of that well-known carrying company, to the whole region of the West in par-

ticular, and the entire country in general, is recognized by every journal of importance.

We cordially add our word to the great mass of testimony in favor of the firm, which has done immense and incalculable good by its efficient express system, the only means by which hundreds of newly formed towns and mining camps have been kept in communication with the civilized world. The business of this firm is recognized throughout the West as wonderful in its completeness and admirable in its reliability. And the very part of its system which the Postal Department seeks to abolish—the letter express carrying—is one that is recognized wherever it is in operation as an undoubted public benefit.

The report of the commission was based on a remarkable misunderstanding of the facts. The statement is broadly made that the company carries large quantities of postal matter "on which postage is either insufficiently paid or is not paid at all." So far as we have the means of knowing, this is certainly untrue. The company is scrupulously particular in regard to this matter. The Government does not lose anything by the transaction. On the contrary, it gains much, for the company carries letters into many places where no regular mail has been established, and in the letters, invariably stamped as required by postal regulations, are conveyed in safety, which certainly would not have been sent at all but for Wells, Fargo's express system. Of course, the company carries its own letters free of postage, as we believe every other carrying company does throughout the United States.

The conclusions of the commission, that "the interests and dignity of the Postal Department demand the immediate discontinuance" of the company's letter express business, are therefore not only illogical and unwarranted, but if adopted in effect by the Department, would work great injury to the commerce of the coast and be very unjust to the best carrying company on the continent.

REPUBLICAN SHOWN IN THE SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 2.—The adroit purpose of the republican minority of the Senate in allowing the majority deficiency bill to be engrossed and read a third time yesterday without debating it was disclosed to-day by Senator Edmunds' speech, and is this evening the main topic of comment in political circles. This purpose, it is now seen, was to procure a vote for the bill based upon objections to its political clause, which objections, as set forth by Edmunds to-day, might for the most part have been obtained by amendments as soon as they were stated, had not the majority insisted upon the offering amendments by the parliamentary law which requires all amendments to be voted upon as a whole, without opportunity for further amendments. Edmunds' criticism, it will be observed, was founded almost wholly upon the alleged faultiness of the machinery provided by the new clause for the appointment and control of election officers and were pointed out as likely to be grave difficulties in operating it, and although he charged that the insertion of this clause was a covert attack upon election laws, designed to weaken or practically abrogate them, it was very noticeable that he had refrained from making any charge until the bill had passed beyond the parliamentary stage for amending it in particulars which he most specifically denounced. Hence his subsequent disclaimer that there was only one link in the chain of propositions intended to reverse everything that now exists for the security and protection of the people of the United States under the Constitution, fell short of the intended effect, but the intimation of his speech pointed out that the President will veto the bill as presented, and added impression as a quite generally believed to be founded upon authoritative information as to the President's own belief, and the fact, however, that the President's own event will make no opposition to the scope of the proposition, but will be inclined to express his willingness to approve it if the proposed machinery is perfected and it is presented to him as a separate measure, instead of a rider on appropriation bills.

**RAILROAD NEWS FROM COLORED.**

He informed the committee that the road will be completed in 1893, and when that point is reached the company will have constructed 322 miles of its rail line and be operating a total of 1,000 miles of railroad, and that it will not have received an acre of land or a dollar of money from the general government, although the government has the same provision for

gulate the rate for transportation and the same right of priority of use of all portions of this road for military and postal purposes, as the United States enjoys in regard to the Union Pacific and Central Pacific roads, which were liberally aided from the start. He pointed out that the remainder of the line, 773 miles from El Paso to San Diego is one portion to which a land grant attaches. The ten years' term by Congress for the completion of the road to San Diego, will expire in May, '93, but the company claims that inasmuch as it suspended operations only by reason of the panic of '76, and the general consequences of that panic and as it will have invested fifty million of private capital in the enterprise before it reached the land grant at El Paso the justice of Congress may be confidently invoked to authorize such an extension of the time as will enable the company to complete its work with proper economy and without attempting to rush it through at exorbitant cost.

material into candy in its various forms, to mar the purity or debase the taste of sugar. Adulteration of food, and especially of candy, is the curse of the age. The principal adulterant used in the manufacture of candy by unscrupulous candy makers is a species of white earth. This deleterious article is used by fraudulent manufacturers to increase the weight and underseal the honest dealer, and even the strictly honest confectioner may be imposed upon in the impurity of the raw material for the want of a cheap method of analysis. The use of this earth is a very inducement for the confectioners of Utah to adulterate their candies, and if the reports in the investigation of adulteration of raw sugar, by J. W. Parkman, which appeared in the News of recent date, is correct, it is quite possible some of the adulterated article may find its way to Utah. A strong reason why we should produce the article in its purity at home and stop its importation, I should like to see the constitution of 22,000 pounds of sugar manufactured in Utah, would be amply sufficient to cover the whole cost of the necessary machinery for one establishment. Hurry up the sugar factory. I would say in conclusion, there is nothing in all the wide domain of adulteration, which is more prevalent at the present day, for my part, I would sooner see the darlings running around with both fists full of pure candy, than one fist full of grossy purr.
