JOY WAS RAMPANT IN MIDVALE CITY

"Hurrah for That!" Shouted Every Man, Woman and Child In the Town.

DECISION IS WELL RECEIVED.

Resuming Copper Smelting Will Bring Return of Prosperity to All Classes in the City.

With the announcement in Midvale yesterday that Judge Marshall had allowed the modification of the decree of injunction against the United States Smelting company, one of the greatest celebrations ever held at that place was started. From 11:30 o'clock in the morning when the news reached there until long after midnight the celebration was kept up. Bands played, whistles blew, horns were sounded, pans beaten and bells rung.

At 4 o'clock in the afternoon the Stars and Stripes were run up on the copper stack that has been idle for two years. In the evening the band paraded the streets and a grand display of fireworks and a patriotic program were given under the direction of the Commercial club.

Acting Superintendent George W. Metcalf explained the decision which allows the company to smelt ores under practically the same restrictions as lead ore is treated. Mayor Hyrum Goff spoke of the benefits from the decision and declared a great debt was due the late general superintendent, Robert D. Rhodes, for the advances he made in smelting processes. R. H. McDonald and Justice of the Peace Nils Lund also spoke.

Not only the citizens of Midvale, but the farmers about the smelter joined in the celebration as it means that both sides have won a victory and that a better market will be found for the farmer's crops.

STATE ROAD COMMISSION.

Completed Membership Yesterday With Appointment of J. W. Jensen.

At a meeting of the board of trustees of the Agricultural college held yesterday, J. W. Jensen was named as a member of the state road commission. This completes the personnel of the commission, which is composed of the governor, state engineer, state treasurer and representatives from the State University and Agricultural college. The regents of the University recently named Prof. R. R. Lyman as a member of the board. It is expected the road commission will hold an early meeting and take up the matter of building roads according to the provision of the legislative enactment. A state system of roads is one of the objects of the commission, and a highway between Logan and the north to St. George on the south is one of the possibilities of the future.
