Big Forest Fire in Germany.

Berlin, Aug. 3 .- A terrible fire is raging in the extensive pine forests near Kaldenkinchen, on the Dutch-Prussian frontier. Firemen from all the neigh boring villages, aided by the inhabit-ants, headed by their burgomasters, are at work trying to check the flames, but so far without success. Several thous and acres of valuable timber have been destroyed. Train service through the district has been suspended, as the fire has reached the railway track. The damage so far amounts to about

1.00,000 marks (\$40,000). A stiff north wind is blowing and it is feared that the fire will reach the extensive forests in the Aix-La-Chapelle district.
