## NOTABLE UTAH WOMEN.

Mrs. William C. Jennings, the president of the Federation of Women's clubs, occupies the distinction of being the youngest resident of Salt Lake to have been elected to the position of president of the Federation of Women's clubs in America. Her literary and executive ability together with an enthusiastic and active interest in all that tends towards the uplifting of the intellectual standard among women, has made her a leading figure in the work of the club in which she has been engaged. Mrs. Jennings' club experience began in Boston, her early home, where she became a member of the Police club, an organization formed for the sake of art, and of which she was elected president.

In 1903 she married William C. Jennings, son of Salt Lake's prominent citizens, and in the next year accompanied her husband to Salt Lake, where she spent two years. During this visit Mrs. Jennings became a member of the Ladies' Literary club, and upon her return to Salt Lake, after an absence of three years, again identified herself with the club, becoming one of its most valued members. When the state Federation of Women's Clubs was organized in 1906, Mrs. Jennings was elected president of the Federation, the term being for one year and at the expiration of which she was re-elected. For two years the committee demonstrating the success of the Federation in her home for the position. The second term will be completed this month, when, according to the bylaws of the organization, some other still more highly qualified to fill the place.

Mrs. Jennings was born in Boston, and claims as her ancestry, through Francis White, her paternal grandfather, Ferguson White of Mayflower fame.
