Anthony, Favored City of the Great Gem State.

ANTHONY, county seat of | Fremont county, and one of its principal business centers, has a population exceeding 3,000. It is a city of the second class; its business men are enterprising and very enthusiastic as to its future, confidently looking forward to far greater developments and a more material prosperity even than has been experienced in the past. One of the greatest victories for st. Anthony was accomplished at the late election when Fremont county votad bonds for the building of a magnineent county court house, an illustration of which is presented on' this page. The Illustration is from the completed drawing of the architects and when the building is finally erected it will cost \$50,000. Likewise, it will be one of the most modern as well as handsome county buildings in the state of Idaho.

SNAKE RIVER DIVIDES CITY. The North Fork of Snake river runs through the center of the city, and on the main street, running north and south, is spanned by a 60-foot bridge. beneath which the turbulent stream incessantly surges and tosses and seethes and bolls in forcing its passage through so narrow a channel. Immedlately below the bridge the river speads out to a width of 800 feet of pure, sparkling mountain water, an expanse of rapids beautiful to behold. Within the city limits, and perhaps within a distance of less than half a mile, the river falls 30 feet, and can easily and at a comparatively small expense be made to generate almost an exhaustless power, which sooner of later, will be used in furnishing power for industries of various kinds.

St. Anthony has a \$60,000 waterworks and electric light plant, the power for which is transmitted by a canal taken from the Snake river.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS IN PLENTY. St. Anthony has three magnificent public school buildings, one, of them an up-to-date high school structure.

St. Anthony is a land of pure air and fresh water. No country has a finer dimate. The altitude is less than' 5,000 feet, which assures clear, dry atmosphere, with an average of 300 sunshiny days each year. Cyclones, blizzards and thunderstorms are unknown.

FISH AND GAME ABOUND.

As to fish and game, it may be said that the country in and about St. Anthony is the real sportsman's paradise.

St Anthony is close to the Yellowstone National park and is adjacent to the great wild game centers over which the famous Teton Peaks stand guard. The Idaho Industrial Reform school is located at St. Anthony. The institution has 253 acres set apart for its use. In looking back 15 years it is interesting to note that there was but one house within 20 miles of St. Anthony. The general prosperity which is en-joyed by "The Favored City" today is evidenced by the fact that but two business failures have occurred in seven years, and the financial institutions re-port that those failures were in no way due to lack of patronage. Reports on business conditions in St. Anthony will show that the volume of business transacted this year will exceed that of any previous year by from 50 to 75 per cent.

No section of the great Snake river valley can produce better or larger crops than the country surrounding St. Anthony.
