The limits of the navy must be fixed by the progress of foreign powers. Several powers were rapidly developing their naval strength at present, but not one at a pace to be compared to Germany. Mr. McKenna explained that he se-lected Germany as a standard by which to measure British requirements only for arithmetical purposes and he did not presume to any expression of feel-ing or opinion except one of respectful admiration for Germany's administra-tive and professional efficiency. The present difficulty of the government lay in the fact that it did not know the rate at which German construction was going on. It estimated that 13 Ger-man Dreadnoughts and Invincibles might be completed by 1911, as against 12 Dreadnoughts and four invincibles

man Dreadnoughts and Invincibles might be completed by 1911, as against 12 Dreadnoughts and four Invincibles which Great Britain would have by November, 1911. If Germany accelerated her construc-tion work she would have 17 of those ships by April of 1812. Great Britain could not afford to inke risks, and if she was to maintain her superiority the admiralty must be in a position to obtain the delivery of four additional Dreadnoughts by March. 1912, thus giving Great Britain 20 such vessels, against Germany's possi-ble 17. Mr. McKenna said he consid-ered that the maintenance of superi-ority depended upon superiority in Dreadnoughts atone. He paid a trib-ute to the ''extraordinary growth' in the construction of ships of the largest size in Germany. Two years ago there were no ships capable of competing with the British Dreadnoughts, while today Germany has several such ves-sels, besides three in course of con-struction. In view af these facts, if the house approved the estimates, ar-ders would be given out immeidately so that four additional Dreadnoughts could if necessary, be completed by March of 1912.
