AT HOME AND ABROAD.

ST. LOUIS, June 16.—Foraker will practically have the details of organization of the committee on resolutions perfected when the committee first meets after the appointment. He has been giving the matter careful attention especially with a view to securing the best representation possible on the sub-committee on the financial plank. He accordingly assigned the service of the preparation of this plank to Patterson, Ill.; Lauterbach, New York and Teller, Colorado. It is also decided that Lodge, Mass., be made chairman of the sub-committee which will be appointed to deal with foreign affairs and charged especially with the preparation of the conventions expression on Cuba. The Massachusetts senator has given especial attention to this subject as a member of the Senate committee on foreign relations. He has been a persistent supporter of the recognition of belligerent rights to the struggling island and will doubtless seek to commit the party to that course. The selection of Teller as a member of the sub-committee on finance is for the purpose of giving the free coinage element a hearing, but he does not hope to have his financial views accepted.

It was understood that the change demanded involved the striking out of the word silver. Lauterbach prepared an amended reading as follows: "We believe all obligations, either in currency or paper, issued by the government, should be payable in gold coin."

His amendment had not been submitted to Hanna or his representatives up to the time of the meeting of the committee, but it was understood that Lodge favored it. It will be disposed of during recess this afternoon.

LONDON, June 17.—The Daily News has a dispatch from Constantinople which says: Miss Shattuck, the courageous American who remained at Orfa during the outrages, has been forbidden to send orphans here despite the fact that the people of Orfa are dying of starvation.

Mrs. Lee, the wife of the American missionary at Marash, was not allowed to leave there with her children until the American charge d'affaire, Mr. John W. Riddle, had been interviewed. She was peremptorily forbidden to bring away Armenian children.

BREST, France, June 18.—Reports are slowly being obtained of the loss of the Castle liner Drummond Castle, bound from Capetown to London, with 144 passengers and 103 officers and men. The steamer was going full speed shortly before midnight on Tuesday, June 16, heading around Finisterre from the Bay of Biscay, and making for the British channel. Off the Finisterre island Ushanta, about thirty-six miles northwest of here, in a group of thirty islands the Drummond Castle was lost. Her safe course should have been away outside Ushante, upon which island is a lighthouse and a signal station. But for some reason not satisfactorily explained the steamship headed inside Ushante. Between that point and the main land, France is a line of islands, including Molene and Leconquett connected by ridges of rock with each other. At different places there are ridges between which vessels can pass with safety, but between Ushante and Molene, the latter island being about half way to the mainland, is a stunken reef of rocks with deep water on both sides of it and covered in parts even at the lowest tides. It was on this ridge that the Drummond Castle struck while going at full speed. The steamer must have struck so as to tear a big rent in the bottom from stem to stern, thus filling the water-tight compartments almost immediately and sending her to the bottom on the other side of the reef in about three minutes. Two boats were loaded after the Castle liner struck. One capsized and only three men were saved out of 247 people on board.

The British second class cruiser Sybille which was off Ushante at the time of the disaster, heard the signals of distress and sent boats to rescue but without avail. Of the saved, two men were picked up floating on the wreckage, by a fisherman from the mainland. A man named Marquardt reached the Molene island. About ten bodies have already been recovered.
