GOVERNMENT.

Government is a great corporation, and every citizen is a stockholder, and the stockholders meet from time to time to elect the directors, and if the stockholders want the affairs of their corporation conducted for the benefit of all the people they must select di-rectors who will guard the interests of all the people. I believe that today the reform forces in this nation stand for the rights and interests of ninetynine out of a hundred of the American people, and I believe that the Republican party stands for the other hun-dredth man, whose money and whose will coerce where he cannot persuade and corrupt where he cannot teach by reason. The Republican party was so bad in 1896 that it drew out of it hun-dreds of thousands of men whose convictions were stronger than party ties, and it has been the boast of silver Republicans that they thought them-selves out of the Republican party, and I assert that no silver Republican can ever think himself back into the Re-

publican party. Abraham Lincoln, early in his administration, sent a message to Con-gress, in which he warned his countrygress, in which he warned his country-men against the approach of monarchy. What frightened him? Why, he said that it was the attempt to put capital upon an equal footing, if not above, labor in the structure of the govern-ment. It frightened him. If Abraham

Incoin was frightened nim. If Abraham Lincoin was frightened at what he saw in the early '60s, what would be his alarm today if he could see capital en-throned and labor debased in every policy of the Republican party! Talk about a silver Republican going back to the Republican party. Why, no my triends: the tide is not from no, my friends; the tide is not from the silver Republicans back to the Republican party; it is from the Repub-lican party outward to the reform

forces of today.

EQUAL TAXATION. We want equality of taxation. Isn't

it strange that men who are paying more than their share of the expenses of the government can hurrah for the Republican party knowing that that party is responsible for this inequality. I can understand how a man with a large income derived from legislation that gives him special privileges, I can understand why such a man can vote a Republican ticket, but how can an ordinary man who asks only the chance to labor and to live and desires not special privileges, but simply equal rights, how can such a man vote the Republican ticket today? My friends, if you will examine the

question of taxation you will find that the Republican party is making the poor man pay more than his share and the rich man less than his share. And while the man who pays less than his share may be able to wink at such a system, what do you think of the man who, knowing of the system, still supports it? I was riding on a train in Iowa last fall, and they came around to collect the fares for sitting in the parlor car, and they wanted 30 cents. Well, I won-dered why they wanted 30 cents; I had been in the habit of paying 25c and 50c, and I did not understand why they had asked for 30. So I inquired, and told me that it was on account of they that tax law that required a 1-cent stamp on the receipt, and that they had made it 30 cents, collecting 1 cent from the passenger under the law, and 4 cents for the trouble that they had to go to in collecting the 1 cent. If you will examine the taxation system favored by the Republican party, you will find that they are all the time devising some method by which the burden shall be placed upon the people and the corporations ex-empted. You go into your bank and give a check, and you will find that the man who gives the check for \$5, because he has not much money, and draws out but little at a time, will pay 2 cents on the check, just the same as the man who gives his check for \$1,000 or \$2,000, and draws out a good deal at a time. Is that taxing men in proportion to their wealth or their incomes? Oh no, Such a system of taxation is obnoxious to Republicans.

Algiers, March 26 .- Field Marshal Sir Donald Martin Stewart died this morning in his seventy-seventh year.

The late Sir Donald Stewart, who was born March 21, 1824, was educated at Aberdeen University, and entered the Bengal Staff corps in 1840. He was a major in 1856 and a general in 1881. He served at Peshawur in 1854; in Allyghur in 1857, and was deputy assistant ad-jutant-general at the siege of Delhi, assistant adjutant-general at Lucknow and served in Rochilcund. In 1867-68 commanded the Bengal troops in. Abyssinia and was chief commissioner of Andaman and Nicobar islands from 1869 to 1874. He was with the Candahar division in the Afghan war, 1878-80, was at the battle of Ahmed Khol in 1880, and commanded the troops at Cabul and in northern Afghanistan till their final withdrawal in 1889. He was member of the viceroy's council in 1880 commander-in-chief in India,1881-85, and member of the Indian council 1885-95.
