

MEYENDORFF IS INVESTIGATING

Left for Portland Last Night Where He Will Continue Work.

UNCOVERING THE FRAUDS.

Special Agent of General Land Office of Government—Has Had Most Remarkable Career.

M. A. Meyendorff, who was the principal witness before the interstate commerce commission yesterday, left last night for Portland. He is a special agent of the general land office of the government, and his work in uncovering fraud in Wyoming has made his testimony here notable.

This is not the first visit of Mr. Meyendorff to Salt Lake. He lectured here 11 years ago on his experiences as a Siberian prisoner, and the story of his travels is one of many and varied adventures.

He is a graduate of Michigan university in engineering, and has been in the government service for nearly 30 years, as an expert in construction of government buildings at Helena, Mont., then as assayer in a Helena office, and finally as a special agent of the general land office of the government, and his work in uncovering fraud in Wyoming has made his testimony here notable.

In Oregon and Washington he is assisting Francis J. Henry to uncover the land frauds, and as Henry is now in San Francisco the bulk of this work will fall on Meyendorff. He is 56 years of age and was born in Poland. As a boy he fought in a Poland uprising and when captured was sentenced to life imprisonment in Siberia. While serving the sentence, word reached a half-brother in America that this fate had been meted out to one of his kin. The half brother, Julian Allen, had just escaped from an American army service, and a Polish regiment which fought in the civil war. He appealed to President Lincoln to intercede in behalf of his brother, and as that he be sent to America. The request was made by the president and granted by the Russian. In this remarkable manner the man whose life promises to be in the service of the government, chopping at the roots of graft and fraud, was liberated to prepare for his task. His brother sent him to Auburn, Ariz., immediately upon his arrival here, and it was this college training that equipped him to meet senators and high officials on their own mental plane, and to fight them untraded.

LIBEL SUIT WILL STIR UP INTEREST

Filed by A. A. Anderson. Formerly of Yellowstone Forest Reserve.

WAS REMOVED FROM OFFICE.

Many Protests Were Made Against Him and He Was Threatened—Attacked by a Newspaper.

(Special to the "News.")

Meeteetse, Wyo., Nov. 29.—A. A. Anderson, former superintendent of the Yellowstone forest reserve, who was removed last spring by President Roosevelt at the end of one of the bitter fights ever waged against a public officer in this state, is evidently preparing to get even with his enemies. Col. Anderson has for years maintained a lodge in the mountains to the west of Meeteetse. He is a painter of no mean ability, spending his summers in the mountains and his winters at the clubs of the swell set in New York City. A few years ago he was appointed superintendent of the forest reserve, and residents of this section immediately set up a howl, claiming he was a non-resident and not qualified to administer the affairs of his office. It was also charged that he was the head of a syndicate of New York club men who proposed to hold the forest reserves for themselves as a hunting ground, and for a time it did look as though Supt. Anderson was working unnecessary hardships upon the sheep and cattle men in order that the wild game of the section might be protected.

Protest after protest was filed with the president, and many mass meetings were held by the indignant ranchers. Anderson was threatened, but all to no purpose. In the meantime Anderson purchased a ranch and entered upon the raising of blooded cattle, and he has today one of the finest ranches on the Greybull river. He became a citizen, but the ranchers kept on protesting, until finally Anderson resigned.

SUIT FOR \$10,000.

He immediately entered suit against the Meeteetse News for alleged libel, and this case will be heard at Sheridan next month. Anderson asks for \$10,000 damages.

In order that the criticisms would not all be one way, Anderson two years ago purchased the Meeteetse Standard, and this paper has been conducting his campaign. A few days ago Mr. Anderson purchased the Basin Republican for the purpose, it is alleged, of having a paper at the county seat that would print the Anderson side of the forest reserve and other questions in which the owner has been or may at any time become involved.

The outcome of the libel suit of Anderson against the Meeteetse News will be watched with interest. Anderson is wealthy and will push his suit through the highest courts in the land.
