SOME STATISTICS CONCERNING SUGAR

Total Production of All Kinds for 1903-4 is 10, 425, 800 Tons of 2,240 Pounds Each.

RATIO BETWEEN CANE AND BEET

Percentage of Increase in Former for Last Five Years Has Been About Double.

Washington, Nov. 15 .- The department of agriculture, in its official crop reporter for November, announces that the indications are that the world has entered on a new era in the production of cane sugar. The department quotes estimates placing the total sugar production of the world in the year 1903-4 at 10,425,000 tons of 2,240 pounds each, including 4,342,800 tons of can sugar and 6,088,000 tons of beet sugar, and says as to cane sugar:

"During the past five years the world's output of this product has increased from 3,000,000 to more than 4,000,000 tons, quantitatively the greatest increase ever made in any five-year period in the history of this industry. Moreover, for the first time in a half century the ratio of increase in the world's production of cane sugar has exceeded that of sugar made from beets, the percentage of increase in the former product for the five years being about double that of the latter.

"The four years from 1900-01 to 1903-4, inclusive, were each in its turn record-breaking years for the production of sugar. The previous high record crop (3,630,000 tons), was that of 1894-95, the crop made just before the outbreak of the revolution in the most 4.000,000 tons, quantitatively the great-

outbreak of the revolution in the most important producer, Cuba: "The high record crop in the history

"The high record crop in the history of the world's beet sugar production was that of 1902-3. Since that date there has been a decline in production in Europe, amounting in all to about 1,000,000 tons, but the present year's estimated output still shows a considerable increase over that of five years

The report says that about 80 per cent of the can sugar of the world is now annually produced on tropical and semi-tropical islands. The prospective output for 1903-4 of the leading single producers, Cuba and Java, constitutes 45 per cent of the world's can sugar.

WAR WITH TURKEY.

Bulgarian and Servian Officers Trying to Provoke One.

Sofia, Nov. 15.—Previous reports of a conspiracy of Bulgarian and Servian officers to provoke war with Turkey have been officially confirmed. According to these reports, Turkey was to be attacked by the combined armies of the attacked by the combined armies of the two countries. A search of officers' quarters at Philippopolis, Tirnova and other places in Bulgaria, it was said, revealed compromising letters and revolutionary documents directed against Prince Ferdinand. This latter part of the rumor, however, proves to be untrue.

It is said that a numbr of young offi-cers of Macedonia nationality planned to create a casus belli by forcing a con-flict on the frontier. The minister of war has ordered the removal of 140 officers.

FOUR MEN ARRESTED.

Thought to be Implicated in Theft Of \$50,000 Worth of Jewelry.

New York, Nov. 10.—Four men have been arrested in connection with the stealing of jewelry worth \$50,000 from the auction rooms of Knight, Frank & Rualey, in Conduit street, a month ago, cables the London correspondent of the Herald.

Berlin, Nov. 15 .- The Dresdner bank the Schaaffhausen Bank Verein arranged a community of interests, the agreement to continue for ests, the agreement to continue for 30 years, beginning Jan. 1 next. Both banks will be operated separately, but the earnings will be pooled and divided in proportion to the capital and reserve fund of each.

According to a published statement, the combination amounts approximately to fusion and the securing of all the advantages thereof, while avoiding its disadvantages. Each bank agrees to elect two directors and three members of the board of overseers of the other bank, thus securing the mutual direction of the institutions. ection of the institutions.

rection of the institutions.

The capital of the Dresdner bank is \$32,500,000, and that of the Schaaff-hausen Bank Verein is \$25,000,000. The reserve funds of the two banks amount to \$13,500,000, and their joint capital to \$71,000,000, thus making their union the strongest agggreation of banking capital in the world, with the exception of the Bank of England.

The German financial world was completely surprised by the announcement of the combination, not the slightest intimation of which had leaked out until the matter was published in to-

est intimation of which had leaked out until the matter was published in to-day's newspapers. There has been a vague suspicion, however, that some large financial operations were forth-coming, owing to active buying of the stocks of both banks, which operators on the market were unable to explain.

THE LOSING OF THE ISTHMUS.

It is a Tragedy for Colombia-Growing Feeling Against Colombian Pres ident Due to His Indec's on.

Panama, Nov. 15 .- President Marroquin's statement as conveyed in a cablegram to Gen. Plaza, president of Ecuador, that Gens. Reyes, Caballeros, Ospina and Holguin are now marching on the isthmus to "suppress the isthmian traitors." has set the entire population of the isthmus laughing. Protected by the impenetrability of the land and the many leagues of coast line separating the isthmus from Colombia and confident that the Unitedd States intends to prevent the landing of Colombian soldiers from the sea, the isthmians feel that their security is abso-

WHAT IT MEANS TO COLOMBIA. The loss of the isthmian territory is of course, a tragedy for Colombia. The government at Bogota is probably ignorant of the attitude taken by the government of the United States during the last two weeks. In a frenzy to save its face," to appease an angry and disappointed populace and to satisfy the public demand for some appearance of activity and an attempt to save the honor and the territorial integrity of Colombia, the government is no doubt promising and threatening send forces to the coast and to ta other aggressive steps. The realization by the Colombian government of the impossibility of sending troops to the isthmus would not necessarily deter it from taking these steps, which, as already stated, are intended merely to

satisfy the people.

Well informed people on the isthmus believe that the Colombian government is going through all these forms of organizing expeditions not merely for the foregoing reasons, but owing to the necessity of forestalling or of weakenng the threatened revolutionary out-

FEELING AGAINST MARROQUIN. The growing feeling against President Marroquin is believed to the due to the fact that he did not show sufficient determination to effect the ratifi-cation of the canal treaty, which would have saved the isthmus to Colombia, have saved the isthmus to Colombia, and because he appointed Gen. Obaldia governor of the department of Panama after Obaldia had declared that he would remain a Colombian if the treaty were ratified, but that otherwise he would only be a Panamanan. Gen. Obaldia was born in Chiriqui in the state of Panamanan.

state of Panama.

Miners and others familiar with the coast on both sides of the isthmus declare that any attempt to march an expeditionary army from any part of Columbia to the isthmus would be fu-tile. Both coasts consist of impassible jungles and swamps and rivers, without towns or roads or any means for the provisioning of an army. The members of the junta have not the slightest fear that any such expedition will be attempted, and they receive the eports of such expeditions with equa-

RELY ON UNITED STATES. What is described here in Panama as the "United States' broad interpretation of the clause of the treaty of 1846 regarding the protection of traffic across the isthmus," is deemed ample for the preventing of the transportation of troops by sea and consequent hostilities. The Pacific Steam Navigation company, a British concern plying becompany, a British concern, plying be-tween Panama and Buena Ventura, has caluse in its contract with the Colombian government which says that it must, "under normal conditions," transport government troops. It can, however, be said authoritatively that the company will not transport

Colombian troops to the isthmus under present conditions, and that it has not been asked by the Colombian governnent to do so

ment to do so.

Other vessels which bring troops from any Colombian port for any point in the republic of Panama will be prevented by the naval authorities from disembarking them in case they insist on doing so after warning has been given them.

REVENUES OF NEW REPUBLIC.

The revenues of the new republic, if economically administered, promise to meet all expenses. These revenues consist of 10 per cent ad valorem duty on imports, slaughter-house taxes, liquor licenses, and similar sources of locations. licenses and similar sources of income, as well as the fair yearly sums derived from those holding a monopoly of the tobacco business, from the gambling privileges at Panama and Colon, and from the lottery. These sources of revenue do not include \$5,000 in gold per week formerly paid by the Panama Railway company, a United States concern, to the Bogota government, which retained \$4,500, giving to the state of Panama only \$500.

The government of the new republic, realizing the necessity of keeping its army in a contented condition, is paying its officers and soldiers with the utmost promptness.

Gen. Obsidia appeared on the invitation.

Gen. Obaldia appeared on the streets of Panama yesterday for the first time since Nov. 3, when the independence of the isthmus was proclaimed. He was greeted cordially by friends and equaintances.

It is generally asserted that the isth-mians will eventually insist uopn the separation of church and state, as sepseparation of church and state, as separation was one of the measures demanded by the Liberal party in the last revolution, and the population of the isthmus is Jargely Liberal.

The question of the admission of Chinese is being seriously discussed by the press and in other quarters, the concensus of opinion appearing to be opposed to such admission.

The Great Falls stage is stuck in the snow somewhere between Lewistown and Phillsrock between Lewistown and Philisrock. Lewistown has had no train since Fri-day and two engines are now cab deep in drifts within a few miles of Lewi town. The stockmen are praying for a chinook as it is feared heavy loss will result if a warm spell is not speedily forthcoming. The temperature tonight is 5 below and still dropping. 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
