Dear Mr. E. A. Mearns:

Editors Deseret News:

For some weeks past I have been thinking of or less busily engaged in writing you a letter relative to the State, and, as I intimated in a former letter, will give the reader of the Deseret News, nearly all of whom are genealogists, some information relative to the prospects of success in that kind of work in Pennsylvania.

In the first place, no public records have been kept of births, marriages and deaths in any of the towns or villages in the State, and as I am informed. This includes all the usual circumstances of a family. It is more difficult, expensive, and uncertain to make genealogies in Pennsylvania than it usually has been elsewhere, and, where, in most villages, has been kept more or less imperfect records. The Quakers, or Friends, however, have kept records in the form of church books, and, in some instances, in tracing genealogies among that sect, and any of the same may be descendants of Quakers in Pennsylvania, are likely to obtain reasonably complete genealogies that the descendants of other classes of its old inhabitants could have obtained.

Lancaster county once included a large tract of country in the central part of the State, that has since been divided up into half a dozen counties, and, in 1819, the public records up to that date, unfortunately, were destroyed the fire, and, thus, unfortunately, were destroyed the records of the central Pennsylvania could have been obtained.

While in Harrisburg, three weeks ago, I visited the state library, and, in the great hall of the United States. The librarian's assistant treated me with much courtesy, and placed my remarks, and I am sure, he would assist me. But the information on the books furnished on genealogical matters was but meagre. In fact there are but few, if any, published volumes in the State are calculated to throw much light in the genealogies of its old settlers, and, until within a few years, the State seems to have been careless in such matters. Lately, however, parties in various parts of the State have begun to interest themselves in collecting records and information on a subject. While in Harrisburg I made the acquaintance of Dr. W. H. Egis, author of a book on the history of Pennsylvania, a voluminous work, gave me some valuable information, was well posted on genealogical and historical matters, and kindly invited me to write to him if I desired, but some of his records would do for me and he would gladly oblige me.

I have now been in Philadelphia for some time, and yesterday I discovered means of obtaining any information relative to genealogies in this city and county. I had tried to learn something at several libraries, but some of the librarians, during the heated term, and others did not afford the information desired. Yesterday, however,
