WASHINGTON, 27.—The amend-

ments of the Senate to the bill

regulating the advertisement of

mail letters were non-concurred

in.

The House then went into com-

mittee of the whole on the Indian

may be required to pay for goods

and supplies shall be immediately

available.

General debate having then dis-

sipated, the bill was read by

sections. After adding two or

three unimportant amendments

the committee arose and the bill

passed.

The House then went into com-

mittee of the whole on the legisla-

tive executive and judicial ap-

propriation bill, Eden in the

chair.

The total amount appropriated

by the bill is \$14,735,000.
