# SUGAR FACTORY FOR LEWISTON.

Preliminary Surveys for Building Factory-To be Completed This Season.

# FUNERAL OF MRS. HUTCHINS.

### L B. Vance Robbed by Holdups-Street Railway Extension-Ogden & Northwestern Sued.

Ogden, Feb. 3 .- As has already been announced in the "News," the Lewiston, Cache county, sugar factory is an assured fact. The company to build the new plant will be known as the Lewiston Sugar company, which is composed of practically the same gentlemen as the Amalgamated Sugar company of this city. The first work preparatory to the commencement of the construction of the buildings will be made by Joseph A. West, who went to Lewiston seph A. West, who went to Lewiston today to make the necessary surveys and stake out the proposed building joundation. Just as soon as the weath-er will permit, the work on the build-ing will be commenced, and pushed to completion, so that the factory will be ready for this year's business. The de-cision to build the factory was definite-in dediced upon vestorday, and a numbe of matters were adjusted that had been retarding the progress of the proposition. The machinery for the factory has been ordered already, and will be shipped this summer. The plant will cost about \$350,000, and will have a daily capacity of 600 tons, which will

be considerably larger than the Ogden plant, and the same capacity as the Garland factory, and the two Idaho mills. The Lewiston factory will obviate the

OGDEN & NORTHWESTERN SUED. Damage suits with claims aggregat-

ing \$3,755 have been started against the Ogden & Northwestern raliway by property owners in North Ogden. The suits grow out of a fire which occurred at North Ogden July 14 last, and which burned a quantity of hay in the fields and in the stacks, as well as destroying fences and some buildings belonging to various farmers.
