MAY IMPEACH GLASSMANN.

Efforts Making to That End by Attorney Macmillan and Others.

Burglars Given Heavy Sentences—Other Court Cases—Samuel Brown Acquitted—McKinley Fund.

The case of Samuel L. Brown, charged with assault with a deadly weapon, came on for hearing before a Judge Rolapp and a jury yesterday. A number of witnesses were examined testifying of the assault and Aaron N. Ross, in which Brown assaulted and cut Ross with a pocketknife, but the evidence went to show that the assault was committed in self defense. The jury after about an hour's deliberation returned a verdict of not guilty and the defendant was discharged.

When court convened Judge H. H. Spencer was on the bench and the court issued an attachment for him which was served by Deputy Sheriff Cave, who brought the defendant before court for trial. The court was satisfied with the explanation and excused the default.

In the case of Charles Edd vs. the Utah Pacific Railroad company, 30 days additional time was granted plaintiff in which to file and serve bill of exceptions on appeal.

In the case of the State of Utah vs. John W. Hooper, charged with battery, the appeal was dismissed on motion of Attorney Gidson and the hearing in the case was remanded to Justice Thomas Chapman's court.

In the case of Joseph Nielson against Ellen Nielson, administratrix, the demurrer was sustained and the citation was dismissed.

Suit was filed in the Second district court by John Scoville & Sons Co., against John E. Ross et al to secure judgment in the sum of \$219.45, alleged to be due for merchandise delivered by the defendant company to the plaintiff. The amount has never been paid.

TO IMPEACH MAYOR GLASSMANN.

Attorney Macmillan, former city attorney, has prepared a complaint to be filed in the district court which will impeach Mayor Glassmann on the ground that he has been convicted of a misdemeanor and is, therefore, ineligible to the office of mayor.

It will be remembered that Mayor Glassmann was recently convicted for health laws of the state, and was fined \$100, which he failed to pay under protest, to save costly litigation to the county. In the view of the attorney preparing the complaint the payment of the fine makes the case of Mayor Glassmann a prima facie evidence for impeachment proceedings.

Chapter 7, laws of 1898, provides that the governor and other state and judicial officers except justices of the peace shall be liable to impeachment. Section 456, chapter 8, R. S. 1898, says: All officers not liable to impeachment shall be subject to removal from office for high crimes, misdemeanors or malfeasance in office, as in the chapter provided.

Section 456, R. S., says: An accusation in writing against a district, county, precinct, municipal or school district officers or officer of any board of education for any high crime, misdemeanor or malfeasance in office may be presented by the grand jury or by the county attorney of the county in which the officer accused is elected or appointed.

Section 457, R. S., is as follows: Upon a conviction of such at such time as it may appoint must pronounce judgment that the defendant be removed from office.

The general interpretation of the law on which the proceeding is based is that in the lower courts the complete evidence, and if it is possible for the case to go beyond this, then at least the burden of proof will rest on the defendant to show that he was unjustly convicted.
