Miss Rosalie Pollock Advocates Acquirement of Plots More Accessible Than Liberty Park.

"Public Playgrounds and Baths" was the subject of an address last hight by Miss Rosalie Pollock before the Unity club. A discussion generally and enthusiastically entered into followed the talk. Miss Pollock is in charge of the

primary work in the city school. The lecturer advocated the acquirement of more parks by the city, places more easy of access than Liberty park. and said that much more attention should be given to organizing the play of children. She said that the school buildings should be used all the year for social purposes, by night as well as by day.

"Physical, mental and moral health follow well directed play." said Miss Pollock. "Plenty of vigorous play is the greatest antidate to vice and orime, and the tension of modern life is so great that a spiendid preparation is more and more needed in order to be ready for the fray when the time come."

Miss Pollock called attention to what is being done abroad for the children and earnestly advocated the establish-ment of gardens with every school, in which the youngstars could deive to their hearts' content and be given the fruits of their labor. She also advised the establishment of tree public baths and said that the great advantages of this lake should be placed within the reach of all.
