twenty barely making expenses. There will be a rush in the spring for better diggings, if not, there will be but little made.

"No doubt the people in the States hear great yarns about California gold, but let them recollect that they hear only one side of the story. They should be cautious not to be led off by those gold 'Every sweet has its yarns. bitter.' Men who are doing well had better let doing better alone. As for coming to California to improve health, not one word of it is true .--

The New Orleans mint is closed, there being no one there who is willing to take it with a salary of \$2,500 and a security of \$50,-000. Mr. MACMURDO, the late treasurer, resigned some months ago, to take effect so soon as his successor should be appointed; but as that has not been done, he sent in a positive resignation, to take effect on the 31st ult. The appointment has been tendered to different persons, but no one has been found failing to take it. So that the mint and Sub-Treasury office are closed.

A San Francisco letter, published in the Daily News, says:-You may be surprised to learn that there is infinitely more suffering and deprivation among the fifteen thousand people who inhabit San Francisco than was ever known in Philadelphia or New York during the most severe winter. There are thousands here who are actually starving; being unable to obtain employment even for their board.

Newspapers, each four cents, to be pre-paid.

Letters from any part of the United States, must be pre-paid to Havana, twelve and a half cents. Chagres, twenty cents. Panama, thirty cents, a single rate.

Letters to California, from any part of the United States, can be pre-paid or not, forty cents, a single rate. Transient newspapers,

three cents each, to be pre-paid.

Letters to Halifax, by British steamers, must be pre-paid, five or ten cents, a single rate, according to distance; letters for the West India British Possessions, the same.

Letters for Great Britain, paid less than twenty-four cents, are considered as UNPAID.
