prudence of this country that temporary residence in another, State or country, does not change the domicile of a citizen nor deprive him of his right to vote in the place of his fixed abode. And as he cannot have more than one permanent domicile, so he cannot vote at more than one place and that must be where he lives when at bome.

A student who intends to return whence he came, after gradgation or the termination of his studies, cannot legally vote in any other place. If, however, he has mived "for good and al." he may vote, so far as residence can qualify him, wherever he settles down to dwell. A man may change his domicile as many times as he pleases, but if he intends to stay but temporarily that does not make him a resident in either place. The intent is what governs in this matter. And as the intent is the essence of crime, if these students did not intend to violate the law, although they may have intended to go home after finishing their studies, and this can be made clear to the court, it is not probable that they will be severely punished.
