

about the Palmer House, which is at present the great national political center, was renewed early this morning. By 8 o'clock the main corridors of the hotel and thoroughfares, leading up to it, where filled with great masses of people which by their very numbers made the progress of the cable cars and carriages very slow and at times well-nigh impassable. In the dining rooms and cafes in the vicinity of the hotel was an army of men hats in hand, waiting their turn for seats at the breakfast tables, in fact the crush has now become so great as to make comfort a matter of only small possibility, and the discomfort has been greatly increased by the fact that the headquarters of the party have been centralized instead of being divided and scattered as was the case with the republican National convention. Still the crowds to be accommodated are much greater than at the first convention, due largely to the presence of the great number of marching organizations, some of which resemble a

by their numbers, and while it seemed probable last night that all had arrived on the scene of action, this morning witnessed the arrival of additional hosts of delegates. Clubs, parties and individuals came pouring into the city on the daily trains without limit and as they moved directly upon the hotels those places became as the day wore on, inaccessible to everybody except

#### STALWART PUSHERS.

The National committee held a session this forenoon and arranged for the distribution of tickets and seating of delegates and alternates of the National Committee which begins its session at noon to-day. The meeting of all the various State delegations began at 10 o'clock. Ohio is the only State whose meeting is postponed as late as 3 o'clock. The reason assigned is that some of the delegates have not yet reported, but it is expected that

may occur in the delegation, and its session is postponed, it is claimed, partly owing to that fact.

The New York delegation went into session at 11 o'clock, and the interest which centres in its action appears to actuate everyone in attendance upon the convention. The in and out supporters of the New York Governor (Cleveland) are greatly encouraged at the action taken by the Kings County delegation last night deciding to support him. They even go so far as to say that the nomination is practically settled, for as goes Kings county so goes the State and the whole convention.

#### MCDONALD TALK IS LOUDEST.

Early to-day another Indiana club, strong in numbers, came swarming into the hotel, waving the McDonald banners and cheering for their man. The Indiana men are striving hard to impress upon others that he is the most available man and will heal all the strife. Among the delegations arriving at the Palmer House this morning were a number Maryland men, and the remainder of the delegates from Minnesota, West Virginia, Louisiana, Tennessee and Mississippi. The headquarters of the various States presented the view of wearied men sleeping in chairs after a night of vigil. The principal work of the national committee will be to name the temporary chairman.

#### TEMPORARY CHAIRMAN.

Wm. G. Viles of Wisconsin, and Governor Hubbard of Texas, are the two gentlemen most prominently mentioned, but a desire to compliment the Northwest and South runs counter to the desire to have some representative Western German and Peter Lieber of Indiana, has been named in this connection.

#### FOREIGN.

LONDON, 3.—The Faraday has laid 200 miles of the eastern shore end of the Bennett-Mackay cable, and returned to Queenstown for coal.

Brady next Wednesday will submit to a meeting of the electors of Northampton whether he shall continue to retain his seat in Parliament, which he never was allowed to occupy.

At a conference of the members of the Lords and Commons to day, it was unanimously agreed to introduce the deceased wife's sisters bill into the House of Lords at once.

A dispatch from Cairo says letters from Khartoum state that Khartoum was captured the latter part of May without difficulty. There was no massacre. Most Europeans turned Mohammedans. Among those who did not was Gen. Gordon, who is quite safe, and is allowed the freedom of the Mahdi's camp. Mahdi himself is at Khartoum. The Europeans are well treated.

LONDON, 3.—The Irish Catholic Bishops have asked the English government to intervene to preserve their rights as British subjects which they claim are threatened by proposed spoliation.

At a Jeromist meeting last night, Pa-

cal made a violent speech, declaring Prince Victor had forfeited all right to the throne, because he provoked a division in the party. A resolution of devotion to the Prince was passed.

Paris, 3.—In a Cabinet Council to-day Ferry stated that the Chinese foreign board would not disavow the action of the Chinese regular troops at Langson. The board admitted that the Chinese army obeyed orders to retain possession of that city, though this is contrary to the second article of the recent Franco-Chinese treaty, which provides for the immediate withdrawal of the Chinese garrison. The Chinese, however, were contented to evacuate the frontier towns, conditional upon the signature of a definite treaty between France and China. China also refused to recognize the stipulations agreed upon between Li Hung Chang and Captain Fournier for the evacuation of Langson, Barabang and Loo Kay between June 6th and June 26th.

M. Paterotrie, the French Minister to China who has been absent to negotiate a treaty with the King of Anam, has been ordered to go to Peking immediately and to maintain the right of France. In the event of China refusing redress for the action of her troops at Langson, France will immediately declare war.

Active preparations have been made for reinforcements to leave France for the East.

The Chamber of Deputies to-day, after rejecting by 281 to 206 the amendment proposing to abolish the right of the president to dissolve Parliament, adopted the bill for a revision of the constitution by a vote of 414 to 113.

Marseilles, 3.—Eight new cases of cholera are reported since noon to-day. No further deaths here.

Toulon, 3.—Seven persons were attacked by cholera since 8 a. m., and deaths since that hour. Frankfurt, 3. The Zeitung says the new Colonial bank will be supervised and directed by the government in conformity with the laws for the promotion of trans-oceanic commerce, with capital subscribed by private persons. The head office will be at Berlin, and there will be branches at Hamburg and Bremen. Prince Bismarck approves of the measure, and a bill will be presented in the Reichstag at its session to amend the banking laws in conformity with this action.

Cairo, 3.—The minaret of a mosque here collapsed, killing a dozen persons.

Cairo, 4.—The Governor of Dongola telegraphs from Debbah, that he has fought a great battle with the rebels and killed 4,000.

LONDON, 5.—Dispatches from St. Paul DeLoanda, on the west coast of Africa, mention the reports that Stanley has sailed for England. The commanders of Portuguese war vessels ascended the Congo and annulled the treaties Stanley concluded with the natives, which granted to the African International Association sovereignty over territory that has been declared neutral.

Paris, 5.—Ti Aong Poo, Chinese minister, had a conference with Ferry. He disavowed any hostile intention of China in the affair at Langson, which he declared was entirely without Li Hung Chang's knowledge. Ti Aong Poo will remain in Paris until the difficulty between France and China is settled. Paterotrie, French Minister to China, is instructed to consult with Li Hung Chang before conferring with the foreign board. France will waive the indemnity if China pledges Formosa or Hainan until France gains full possession of her possessions in Tonquin which have been conceded to her. If this is not done France will immediately seize one or the other of these islands.

Toulon, 5.—Seven deaths from cholera have occurred here since last night. The oxygen cure is unsatisfactory.


