#### FAVOR STONE BLOCKS.

The board of public works recommended that stone blocks be used in paving the intersection of State and Second and Third South streets. Committee on streets.

#### FROM THE CITY ENGINEER.

Referring to the petition from the Sells Lime, Rock & Cement Co., the city engineer reported that the work required to be done by him had been attended to. Received and filed.

#### SUBDIVISION PLANTS.

The same official reported that plants of Thompson's subdivision had been filed in his office and he asked for instruction regarding approval of the same. The city engineer was given authority to approve the plat.

#### A TUSCARORA RUSE.

The following officials sent in communications tendering their resignations from office: W. A. Stanton, Chief of the Fire Department; W. H. Ryan, Superintendent of Waterworks; City Attorney Hoge; J. M. Harvey, Watermaster and W. F. Shelton, Superintendent of Sewer Construction.

#### CARDS CLEVERLY PLAYED.

The cards were cleverly played and all the councilmen seemed dumfounded. Rich asked if the resignation were to take effect forthwith or at some future date or dates.

The recorder answered that they were to take effect at once, whereupon, on motion of Rich, the resignations were all accepted, being acted upon separately.

#### HOGG GIVES THE MOVE AWAY.

The now ex-city attorney arose and said, with a clumsy attempt at dramatic effect, that he wished to speak to the Council as a "private citizen" and not as corporation council. He had prepared papers in the case of Carrigan vs. Salt Lake City, wherein the city was enjoined from paying Chief Stanton an increase of salary, and suggested that President Loofbourrow be associated with himself in case he should be re-appointed.

Here the gentleman hastily corrected himself by saying, "I mean, my successor." Again Mr. Hogg said that he was only offering advice as a "private citizen" and not as attorney for the city.

Rich—I move that the papers in the case be received and filed and handed over to his successor.

Horn—I move that the Mayor be authorized to employ such legal assistance as is necessary to carry on the suit.

Wantland moved substantially the same thing by asking that it be referred to the Mayor with power to act. Carried.

#### ANOTHER HUNGRY GRAB CON-TEMPLATED.

The committee on streets recommended that the petition of L. C. Trent and Charles Auer, who asked that streets in plat J be graded be granted, and the streets made passable just as soon as land still owned by the city can be sold to advantage, and that the committee on public grounds be requested to report a list of the lands for sale. Adopted. So ordered.

#### ANOTHER INSPECTOR.

The committee on streets recommended the adoption of the following from the board of public works which announced that it had appointed Wm. Holmes inspector of improvements contemplated on Richards street and under contract with the Wasatch Asphaltum Company, to commence

work when needed by chairman Haines, at a salary of \$100 per month.

Hardy said that there were so many inspectors being appointed nowadays that the city would have to appoint guardians for them or they would be lost, and moved that Richards Brothers pay the inspector. After some discussion the motion carried.

#### SANITARY ORDINANCE.

The committee on sanitary rules and quarantine recommended the passage of an ordinance providing for the establishment of receptacles for ashes and the sweepings of sidewalks and providing for the protection of water-ditches from paper and other refuse and prescribing penalties for a violation of its provisions.

#### THE OLD LAMP POSTS.

Horn moved that the committee on streets be instructed to remove at once all old iron gas-lamp posts, except those at corners of streets which he proposes to use for sign purposes.

Wantland moved to amend by omitting all posts on which United States mail boxes were located. Carried.
