MORTALITY AMONG TROOPS.

Exceeds that of the Germans in 1870 -- Cost of the War Enormous-- Was Long Driven Out,

London, Oct. 27 .-- The preparations here to welcome on their return to England from South Africa, the few hundred men who constitute the city monopolized Engelnd's attention this week, banishing from notice matters of international import. Although this, about half a regiment of young Londoners, brokers, clerks and others, has not performed any very heroic feats, thousands of people are pouring into London in order to witness their homecoming and windows along the line of march have been sold at prices almost equal to those demanded at the time of the jubilec procession. In addition decorations and illuminations costing many thousands of pounds have been prepared and business and traffic will be practically suspended the whole day when they arrive and Saturday night will doubtless witness a repetition of the Mafeking carnival. decorations and illuminations

SILK INDUSTRY IN THIS STATE.

Secretary of Agriculture Will Send An Agent to Investigate.

DISCOURAGED HERETOFORE.

#### A Growing Industry in This State and West-Manufacturers in East Writing for Information.

To the Editor:

We are very sure that the people of our States and especially those who are interested in silk curture in Utah will be very happy to learn that the interest is not only growing here, but much interest is manifest in the east, Some manufacturers who, in the past, have done a great deal to discourage its production in the United States, through a knowledge of the quality of the silk produced here, with the fact that it can be as well recled in this country as in the silk producing countries of the Old World, if not better, have, during this year, written for further information and in some cases have requested people coming here on other business to make investigations for them. As a result of the information we have been able to give them, we were very happy a few days ago to receive a letter from Hon. James Wil-

son, secretary of the department of gariculture at Washington, stating that the only man they have who is competent to investigate this subject will be

here early in November to thoroughly look into this matter. No person of in-telligence can fail to fully realize the great henefit which has come to agri-cultural people of this country through this department in the knowledge it has given through printed documents and the establishment of agricultural colleges and experiment stations in difcolleges and experiment stations in dif-ferent parts of the United States, and having done so much in the old estab-lished lines, we are confident the people of the State will join with us in the hope that the time has come when some attention can be given to new possibili-ties. We have done a great deal to ex-tend the knowledge and interest in the importance of this agricultural needed mportance of this agricultural product since the establishment of our own silk commission in Utah, and while we are greatly encouraged in the work that we have been able to accomplish, it has not failed in convincing us that a broadening of the work will undoubt-

GREAT COST OF WAR.

In the midst of the preparations for pelebrating the return of the victorious soldiers it is not astonishing that the people generally fail to realize how extremely costly and long drawn out has the struggle in South Africa. Statistics carefully prepared up to date by one of the largest insurance com-panies show that, proportionately, panles show that, proportionately, more Britishers were killed than the Germans lost in the war with France of 1870-71, while the proportion of those who succumbed to disease was three times as great. Among the rank and file the Germans had 50 per cent more men killed but from disease Great Britain suffered 63 per cent heavier than the Germans. This increase is of such magnitude that even the climatic differences full to account for it. It is asserted that had Great Britain put in the field as many troops as Germany did against France and had maintained proportionate casualties her mortality would have reached 39,359 mer

is assorted that Major Goeld Adams, the British commissioner in Bechuanaland, will be made governor of the Orange River colony. Gen. Buller is slated to resume command of Aldershot. General Kitchener, it is said, will temporarily succeed Lord Roberts in command of the troops in South Africa but will, it is further asserted, be eventually replaced by Major General Lytileton and Kitchener will then be likely Ikely to come home and assume the duties of adjutant general.

## SIMS REEVES AN IDOL.

The death of Sims Reeves on Thurs. day last at Worthing removes an idol of the British public, who, for thirty years, eclipsed any prima donna of these days. Lenghty obituaries and reminiscences of the famous tenor ap-pear on all sides. But a pathetic fea-ture connected with his death has quite escaped attention. Reeves caught a chill a few days ago and it developed into bronchitis. But his condition was so improved Thursday morning that he so improved Thursday morning that he was not believed to be in danger. Mrs. Resves, who is many years younger than the deceased tenor, to whom she was married in 1895, after the death of Reeves, his first wife, left her husband in a modest home in Worthing to sing in London for the benefit of the survivors of Balaclava. Just as Mrs. Reeves modest of Balaclava. commenced singing "Kathleen Mavour-neen," a telegram was received at the theater announcing the death of Sims Reeves. When the song was finished Reeves. When the song was finished and the applause was at its height, the news of her husband's death was broken to Mrs. Reeves, but the audi-ence, ignorant of this behind the scene tragedy, kept on demanding encores. The widow was removed from the theater on the verge of collapse.

#### MARLBOROUGH SUED.

Lady William Beresford (formerly Lilian Duchess of Mariborough) has brought action against the young duke of Mariborough to recover the money which she sepat in improving Blenheim Palace during the life time of the last Palace during the life time of the last duke. The matter came up originally when the present duke succeeded to the title, but owing to the friendly relations existing getween the duke and his step-mother, it was temporarily arranged. Since the duke's marriage to Consuelo Vanderbilt, it is reported, an estrange-ment has grown up between Lady Vanderollt, it is reported, an estrange-ment has grown up between Lady Beresford and her step-son. On more than one occasion, it is said, the young American duchess snubbed her country-woman, (Lady Beresford was formerly Mrs, Louis Hammersley of New York), until the latter determined she could not submit to such treatment any longer, and she now asks the law to compel her step-son to return the amounts she spent on Blenheim.
