CUTTING STATION.

After sinking a 25 foot sump below the 230 level in the East Tintic Development property, a station is now being cut at that depth, says Manager Ralph Kellogg, and as soon as the station is completed it will be possible to resume the sinking of the shaft. The mine will no doubt be holsting consilerable ore within a couple of weeks. The company is anxious to tap the ore at a depth of 330 feet, and with the machine drills the shaft can be put down to this depth in less than a month.
