

RATE WAR AVERTED

Big Grande Western Withdraws Its Cut Rates

IN THE INTEREST OF HARMONY.

The threatened freight rate war between the Big Grande Western and Union Pacific railroads is averted by action taken this afternoon by J. A. W. officials. When the Union Pacific Montana rates were applied to Utah, they were a considerable reduction from former prices, and had to be met by the Big Grande Western, which issued figures on a percentage basis that came under the Union Pacific rate, and there was a prospect of a lively railway war.
