LADY BLOUNT, HIGH PRIESTESS OF THE ZETETICS.

Titled Englishwoman who believes that the earth is flat and stationary, and that the sun revolves around it, and devotes her life to combating the teachings of modern astronomy.

TRIES TO PROVE THE EARTH IS FLAT

Claim of Titled Englishwoman
Who Accepts Moses as Astronomical Guide.

ATTACKS MODERN SCIENCE.

Says it is False and Perilous and
leads to Paganism and Perdition—
Wants to Come to America.

LONDON, May 19.—Among the fads of titled dames that of Lady Blount is unique. She believes in a flat, immovable earth, and devotes most of her time to writing and lecturing against the modern scientific conception of the universe. This excess of zeal—misguided zeal many consider it—has won her for the presidency of the Universal Zetetic society, "Platists" the world over do homage to her. Not a few of them make pilgrimages from America to visit her and abscond with her at her feet.

"Thousands of so-called Christians," wrote Lady Blount in a letter to me, the other day, "believe that the Bible is right on religion, but wrong on science. This position is untenable. If the Bible is the word of God, it is absolutely true. We must accept it as we who else have done of it. We cannot divorce our religion of the Bible from the science of the Bible; hence the Gobots cannot be Bible Christians—nor can Bible Christians be followers of Newton's philosophy."

Lady Blount's letter was written in reply to some queries which I made apropos of a lecture on the Earth's alleged flatness which her ladyship delivered in London the other day. Pinning her faith to what she calls "the Divine System of Cosmogony as revealed by the Creator," she boldly declares all the teachings of science since the days of Galileo false and pernicious. She asserts that the earth, instead of being a giddy ball, whirling through space at the rate of something like 19 miles a second, as scientists have taught us to believe, is a fixed, flat and immovable plane.

Lady Blount is a clever woman with the courage of her convictions and very much in earnest. She edits a journal

called "The Earth" in which the panacea theory of the world is upheld. On the platform, backed up by genocles, she is ready to maintain the same views against all comers. Several dozen clergymen and heretics follow her followers. Branches of the society which she is the high priestess have been formed in the principal countries with the exception of benighted Russia where the "Earth" is not allowed to circulate. She hopes some day to visit the United States and convince folk there that Moses was never posted on the constestation and workings of the universe than Herschel and all the rest of the astronomical novelists of the globular school" as she calls them.

SMALL POTATO PATCH.
Compared with the boundless dimensions of the universe all the patches described to it, the universe is like a small potato patch. The sun and moon, which she credits with being by far the largest of the heavenly bodies, she says, are not more than about nine miles in diameter. The most distant star she estimates "probably not more than some six or seven thousand miles high."

In the form of a catechism, with questions and answers, she tells faithful Zetetics what they ought to believe, according to Biblical science concerning the earth and the heavens. Here are some extracts from it:

"Did God create the earth movable? No. He built it on 'foundations' that it should not be moved forever, or until the ages. 'The world also is established that it cannot be moved.' Gen. xi. 1.

To what may we liken the earth? We may liken it to a vast flat and motionless surface fastened by God's hand, like an anchor. 'For He hath founded it upon the seas, and established it upon the floods.' Psal. xxiv: 2. What did God make on the fourth day?

The sun and moon and the stars, during the eighth day, are "lighted" and the earth is intended for the habitation of man.

God said: "Let there be lights in the firmament of the heavens, to give light upon the earth; and it was so."

Do not the theories of modern astronomy contradict this account of creation?

Yes. They contradict the teachings of Moses which the Christ endorsed in saying that the stars are worlds, etc.

The Bible never speaks of but one world or cosmos, and it calls the stars mere "lights," and the sun a "greater light," and the moon another and independent light. Now it is admitted to make a light a hundred million miles apart and nine times the size of the place to be lighted. Aeronomy also contradicts the word of God in calling the moon an opaque dark body in itself, for the Bible clearly states that God made two great lights, the sun and the moon, and that the moon is only a reflector. But no sphere would reflect over a full disc, as the moon does, hence she cannot be a reflector.

How should we look upon human wisdom when it conflicts with divine?

With distrust, for theoretical science

German Party Threatens World's Peace.

Powerful Faction in the Fatherland, Headed by the Kaiser Himself, Bent on a Worldwide Expansion of the German Empire—Eye on Denmark, Holland, Austria and Part of South America.

BERLIN, May 19.—Germany's war party is a force which must be recognized and reckoned with in international politics, because it is rapidly becoming one of the most potent political influences in the German empire. At present the German war party might just as well be designated by a more peaceful name, even as the German imperialist party, or the German expansion party, since its immediate aims are rather precautions for war than the actual initiation of hostilities with any other country.

The most prominent member of the German war party is the emperor himself, who has far-reaching ambitions regarding the future of his country and of his dynasty. Long before he came to the imperial throne William II was full of contemptuous ideas of the future expansion of the German empire. He is a man of very fine imagination and he sees visions of a future in which the German empire will be the great world power, enjoying predominance and supremacy over all other countries, including those which are now superior to her in magnitude and strength. The German war party, however, whose support of the emperor's foreign policy is all the more reliable because it is bound up with their own personal interests, there are a considerable number of enthusiasts who are aggressive imperialists from purely patriotic and nationalistic motives. Altogether the German war party consists of a combination of important factors in German political affairs.

COUNTRIES TO BE "BAUGHED." The German war party has no clearly defined program, and it is probable that they are guided by its various members who are widely divergent. Generally speaking, the German war party proposes, by means of an energetic and aggressive foreign policy, to increase the power of the German empire, to en-

large its area and to extend its influence.

There is no doubt whatever that many prominent members of the German war party look forward to a time when a much greater part of the map of Europe will be occupied by Germany than is now the case. German imperialists will extend the boundaries of their empire in every possible direction. It is obvious that in certain directions extension will be impossible, at any rate within an immeasurable period of time.

On her eastern frontier Germany is bounded by the Russian empire, which offers an insurmountable obstacle to extensive territorial expansion of the existing empire. On the other hand, France offers an insurmountable obstacle extending along the greater part of the western German frontier, and Switzerland, whose neutrality is guaranteed by the powers, is equally impregnable to German aggression. The neutrality of Belgium is likewise guaranteed by the powers. Germany's remaining neighbors are Denmark, Holland and Austria, and all three of these countries have serious reasons to fear German aggression in a zone too distant future.

Germany has designs on Denmark because the possession of Denmark means command of the entrance to the Baltic sea, will be no easy task.

With the right time comes Germany will take possession of Holland and little compensation as a big commercial concern has in crushing a weaker competitor out of existence, and the acquisition of the Dutch seaboard, together with the port of Rotterdam will give Germany a direct route to Germany.

From a naval and military point of view the possession of a port such as Flushing, within 100 miles of the English coast, will be extremely valuable to Germany. A powerful German fleet with Flushing as its base would be a serious menace to England, and if this were not enough, a naval war would occur in other parts of the world, and the power of the German war party, though it is improbable that Germany will wait until some hypothetical war breaks out before seizing the entrances to the Baltic sea.

German imperialists regard the possession of the northern and southern parts of Denmark as an absurdity which must be abolished at the earliest possible opportunity.

At the headquarters of the German army in Berlin and the headquarters of the German navy at Kiel there are stored away secret plans and secret maps for the invasion of Denmark by a German army and for the seizure of the principal points along the Danish coast by the German navy, and the European situation is so full of threatening possibilities that it is impossible to predict when these elaborate schemes will come into play effect. If the German war party has its own way the independence of Denmark will not be long duration.

One of the most serious weaknesses of Germany is the extreme brevity of the German race in proportion to the size of the German empire, and this disadvantage is increased by the fact that the North sea and the Baltic sea are separated from one another by a foreign country, which holds the principal means of communication. The conquest of Denmark will remove this difficulty, but even then it may not be in possession of all the means of access to the open sea.

The coast line from Hamburg to Emden is far too short for Germany's naval and commercial requirements. German imperialists have long cast envious eyes at Holland, which at present is the chief naval power of Europe, and the North sea, in which Germany would like to predominate. Germans regard themselves as the head of the German race, and hence the natural protectors of the Danes and the Hollanders, and the lesser owners of the Baltic sea. The Danes and the Hollanders, and the Indians and the Chinese. The experience already gained in colonizing Africa has not been extremely encouraging, so that German ambitions are mainly directed toward South America.

Germany intends to be the predominant power of the future both in China and South America. Her ambitions in
