Leading Educators Make Review of Year's Work

INCREASED interest and progress in all departments of educational work has marked the year just closed as an exceptional one. Throughout the state, county and city new features have been added to the already excellent schools of our state until they now stand second to none in the Union. The state, county and city superintendents all report a decidedly successful school year and tell of the excellent new features which have been added to the school work in order to advance the efficiency of the schools. Under the jurisdiction of the state superintendent of schools perhaps the most important feature of the year has been the establishment of high schools in several

The Consolidated System.

The Salt Lake county schools this year have seen the consolidated school districts system established upon a

able. Then another important feature in connection with the city schools has been the establishment of two additional free kindergartens and eight new centers for manual training instruction. The work in manual training and physical education has received a fresh impetus recently by the action of the board of education in authorizing the construction of two new buildings on the high school grounds, one for manual training and one for a gymnasium.

State's New High Schools and Free School Libraries

IN regard to school work in general throughout the state this year State Superintendent of Schools A. C. Nelson has the following to say:

"The leading feature in connection with our schools the past year has been the establishment of high schools. It has been my aim ever since I have been in office to encourage and advance the establishment of high schools and this year has been very successful in that respect. High schools have been established at Mant, American Fork, Lehi and Salina and the high school at Nephi, which was about to be discontinued, has been revived and is now in a flourishing condition with a good attendance and better support from the citizens than ever given it before. At Mant a high school building is being constructed at a cost of \$18,000 and when completed it will be a great credit to that city.

"In addition to the high schools mentioned, ninth grade or first-year high school work has been established in eight or ten school districts. This means the establishment of a complete high school course in those districts within a few years.

School Libraries.

"Not even second in importance to the high schools is the establishment of school libraries in various districts throughout the state. It has been apparent to this office for a long time that the pupils of our public schools should have access to more and also to a better grade of literature than that which may be found in most of the schools of the state. Realizing the great part which the reading of proper juvenile literature plays in the education of the child, and being fully aware of the necessity of such reading matter in most of the schools, this department has prepared the following list of books which various experts consider almost an ideal school library. The books number more than 200, their price is \$142.12. They were selected to cover such subjects as history and biography,

geography and travel, science, legend and fable, poetry, literature, the short story, historical fiction, and such other literature as is most interesting and profitable to the pupil. The books were selected with exceptional care and they are adapted to the various grades, giving material for every child in a school or a home. Most school libraries of this state are but poorly adapted to the requirements even of the eighth grade pupils, thus leaving the other pupils without suitable library books at all. Books equal in number may be secured for less money than that of which this library is offered, but in making this selection, the subject matter, quality of literary material and strength of binding were the all-important considerations. I am pleased to see that a large number of school boards are now buying these libraries.

Uniform Examinations.

"This is the first year of uniform teachers' examinations, which I feel will have a tendency to increase the efficiency and standard of our teachers. There were a large number of failures this year, but I think that will be an incentive for teachers to attend summer school and better prepare themselves for the examinations and for teaching.

"The revenues for school purposes show a steady increase. Last year the increase was \$40,000 over the preceding year and this year the increase will be about as great. A large number of handsome new school buildings have been constructed during the year and in nearly every town and city the best buildings are found to be school buildings.

"The total school population of the state this year is approximately 22,600 children, an increase over last year of about 1,600. The attendance will exceed that of any previous year in all departments and grades from the kindergartens to the university and the people all over the state show an intense interest in educational work."

County Establishes the Larger School District Plan

COUNTY School Supt. Smith gives the following review of work under his jurisdiction:

"After long years of struggle and many reverses, the larger school district plan advocated by the late Hon. John R. Park has found lodgment, and is now in active operation in the schools of Salt Lake county. Thirty-six school districts, embracing the rural

portion of the county, have been consolidated and placed in the hands of three boards of education—Granite, Jordan and Murray. The superior wisdom and economy of these large districts over the smaller ones is apparent to any one making a fair and impartial comparison of their results.

"Under the 26 district system, the small schools were, in some cases,

more enfeebled by numerical poverty than by financial embarrassment, and were an affront to the state. It was difficult to attract able teachers to any of these schools, and the quality of the instruction was poor. The consolidation of the small schools into larger districts has resulted in a more efficient system, and the quality of the instruction has been improved. "The first year high school work was introduced and an enrollment of 12 pupils constitutes this class. These students are taught at Mt. Creek, West Jordan, Sandy and Bingham. The course of study adopted is a standard one, and is equal to that offered in first-year high school. The instructors are well qualified by both education and experience for the work in hand, and the students are enthusiastic and loyal.

"During the past year about \$20,000 has been spent in the erection of modern school buildings, preferential distributed over the three districts. This, together with the amount previously invested, raises the total value of the educational equipment of the county to over \$1,000,000. This is a record for any county in the West.

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City's Free Kindergartens and Physical Training

AS to the work of the past year in the Salt Lake City schools, Superintendent D. H. Christensen has the following to say:

"We have graduated several hundred children in the city schools this year. The most important feature of the year has been the physical education work in all of the grades as well as the high school. This new department promises to become very popular as well as profit-

High school grounds at a cost of \$1,750. It will be completed at the earliest possible date and will be thoroughly equipped with the necessary appliances.

"The total attendance of the city schools at the close of the month of October was 14,148 pupils, an increase of about 500 over the same month last year. In the high school there are 1,054 pupils. The total number of teachers in the schools this year is 347. These are under the direction of 25 principals and seven special teachers and supervisors.

"During the year no new school buildings have been constructed but additions and alterations have been

Seventeen Thousand Attend City Schools

ACCORDING to the school census taken during the last week of June there are 17,000 children in Salt Lake City of school age. This is an increase over the year 1904 of 1,000. The census was taken by the city clerk, and is the most accurate yet taken in the city.

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School Money Nearly Half a Million

During the school year ending June 30, 1905, the total sum of \$422,539.31 was apportioned among the schools of this state out of the state district school fund and the rental and interest on the state school lands. This is an increase of \$20,000 over the apportionment for the previous school year. The money was apportioned upon the basis of a school population of 11,666 pupils which was the result of the census taken during the month of August, 1904 and is at the rate of \$44.61 per capita.
