ELECTION NEWS FROM SORRYLY.

The Moderate Phillips Side to Be Won—Items From Finland.

Sweden.

The Crown Princess of Sweden arrived at Denver Sept. 15.

Miss Nilsson, a widow of Skane, Greenland, celebrated her 50th birthday, Sept. 21.

The export of Norwegian water was 11,000,000 kilogrammes during the first eight months of this year, as compared with 9,000,000 kilogrammes last year.

The import of American coal overtook that of Norway on the port the other day. The cargo contained 2,100 tons, and the customs value was \$1,000.

Fires destroyed the oil wells and lumber yards at Fredrikshald on the coast of Oslo. The loss is heavy.

Rev. Kierberg, of Tafsen and Lundberg parishes has been sued for necessitating the use of his services continually to the tax.

The phonograph is the name of an apparatus invented by Oscar Veltor of Stockholm. The apparatus is to be used in the study of languages and it will receive the message, repeat it, and reproduce it at any time.

The school board of the Kingdom in general has decided to increase the pay of its teachers by the per capita. It was found that a number of boys had stolen both cash and goods for the purpose of being able to buy tobacco.

The present King of Norway has in his possession a Hebrew book which experts claim to be of the same size as the one which Jesus received when he taught in the temple. The book is written in Hebrew. The book is now in one place and on the other—Jerusalem, they say.

The temperance organizations are having meetings and are doing their best to interest the public. They prohibit the manufacture of whisky from small grain. King Oscar has issued a great indulgence, declaring that small grain whisky can be sold at no cost, and the increased price of whisky caused by the increased prices of tobacco.

The mackerel catch is estimated at only 100,000 pounds.

Janitor barrels used in the preparation of liquor are now imported from Hungary and Italy, though the import duty is distributed all over Italy so that it is made to yield quite a little revenue.

A telegram dated Christiania, October 9th, gives the latest election news as follows: Twenty-four members have been elected from the forty-five members of the Left, thirteen Moderate, and ten members of the Right.

Norwegian papers are as full of newspaper as the people are, according to an account of the American journals during the history of our political system.

Books come to be warmly interested in the present political situation. "A Glass" has been translated by a sister-in-law of Count Tolstoi, the great author, and published with an introduction by the author. His translation has been undertaken by his son. Tolstoi's peace "Agitation" also has attracted the attention of the great Russian.
