William Thomson, a native of Scotland, now a resident of Salt Lake, was to-day admitted as a citizen.

At the school trustee election held last Monday, at Springville, Alexander Robertson was unanimously elected by a vote of 130.

The railroad round house, recently burned at Logan, is to be rebuilt. Another is to be erected at Battle Creek, 30 miles north of Logan.

A 3-year-old son of Mr. Dunson, of Alpine, Utah County, accidentally fell into a stream of water, on Monday last, and was drowned.

The Chicago excursionists, expected on Saturday night, did not arrive. The main body reached Ogden, but continued on West.

A freight train on the U. & N. R. R., while side-tracking at Blackfoot last Tuesday, accidentally ran over and killed a drunken man who was lying on the rails.

Two San Francisco organ sellers in Logan, were notified the other day by an officer, to pay the taxes they wished to avoid legal proceedings. They did so.

Yesterday was fine and beautiful. The sun shone out pleasantly, the dust had been previously laid by the rain, and a gentle breeze was abroad, rendering the weather cool and delightful.

Times are becoming dull in Southern Utah and adjacent regions. The "Pine Record" says that even the cattle thieves are migrating from that locality, on account of dull times. The magnet now is in the north.

Mr. Jacob Gates, Jr., of St. George, who has been up to the city several days, started home this morning from Provo. He was accompanied by his sister-in-law, Mrs. Zina Y. Williams, who goes south on a visit to relatives.

Mr. Harry Hayward, who was severely injured by the powder explosion last week, is gradually improving. Yesterday he was not so well, but to-day he is feeling better. He can see slightly, though his eyes are burned considerably.

Supreme Court.—A session of the Supreme Court was held to-day and the following business transacted:

Killing Bugs.—On Friday night, the 3d inst., says the Logan Leader, a lady named Jardi, wife of John Jardi, of the Fifth Ward of that city, being tormented with that species of animated afflictions known as "bed bugs," arose from her couch for the purpose of making a raid on them. Their hiding places were the crevices of the walls of the house which is a frame building filled in between the studding with saw dust; she lighted her lamp and endeavored to roast them out. After searching some time she retired to bed for the remainder of the night; but was shortly aroused by finding that the house was on fire. The family made their escape from the building in their night clothing. The house was burned down, also a corral, in which were some chickens and a calf, all of which were destroyed. Mr. Jardi was away on the railroad at the time of the disaster. On Sunday night at the Fifth Ward evening meeting there was a donation raised to assist the sufferers, who are very poor and need the attention of the charitable. The pathetic side of the occurrence is almost equalled by the amusing absurdity of its origin. It reminds one of the woman who set her boy's hair on fire, and while he was yelling vociferously under the torture of the operation, consolingly said: "Grin and bear it my boy; there's no other way to kill 'em."

"Rip Van Winkle."—This evening Mr. Robert McWade, an actor of acknowledged ability, well known to the Salt Lake public, will treat us once more to his fine impersonation of "Rip Van Winkle," a character in which he has become noted as the rival of the great Jefferson, and of the excellence of which our theatre goers have already had the opportunity of judging. "Rip Van Winkle," although a comedy, is one which blends the humorous with the pathetic, and will therefore furnish a healthful change from the superabundance of fun and burlesque with which the town has been visited of late. There is quite a sufficiency of the comic as those are aware who have witnessed it herebefore, and all tastes will therefore be suited and satisfied. To-morrow night, McWade appears again, in an entirely new attraction.

Wants to Emigrate.—William Millgate, of No. 11 Partridge Lane, Faversham, Kent, England, who has written to the News before in relation to his desire to emigrate to Utah, and his willingness to enter into an agreement to labor for his cost of emigration, renews his proposition in a letter dated May 25th. He is a cement worker by trade, of 13 years' experience, but will do any kind of labor in order to emigrate himself and family. It appears that his former communication was answered by parties in this city, but his replies to them were either never received or elicited no response. He mentions, as references, W. Driver, W. Pleasant Affair.—Brother Edward Cliff, of Mount Pleasant, writes an interesting account, which we cannot publish in *extenso*, of a party given to Sister M. F. C. Morrison, president of the Relief Society of that place, by her sisters of the organization, on the 55th anniversary of her birth. The happy event took place on the 5th inst. The Bishop and Counselors and other prominent citizens were in attendance. Speeches were made, and a present of a beautiful black silk dress (pattern given to sister Morrison) as a slight token of the respect and esteem entertained for her and her many faithful labors in the cause of righteousness. An address was also read signed by Caroline Madson, Christians Peel, Caroline Simpson and Louise Hasler.

Union Pacific Surveyors.—The Logan Leader says:

"Ten surveyors in the employ of the U. P. put up at the Cache Valley House last Friday night, and on the following day went on a special over the U. & N. to a point near Summit, where they left the road and proceeded to the narrow Bear River Canyon, where they commenced to lay off a grade. They seemed to be in a hurry to get on the ground."

Our county surveyor, Edward Hanson, Esq., had been sent to the locality by the same party, some days before the latter arrived, to make a show of surveying the road while the party should be there and fix the location.

This move is doubtless intended to forestall the C. P. and the Utah and Wyoming, as both these companies had talked of running a road through Bear River Canyon, and is one of a series of maneuvers by which these companies are trying to out-general each other."

Fire at the Reef.—A special from Silver Reef, received on Saturday evening, states that at daybreak that morning a fire broke out in the rear of a lodging house kept by Mrs. Bush, and before it could be extinguished, had spread to several adjoining frame buildings which were soon enveloped in flames and burned to the ground. A light breeze from the north excited the apprehension that the whole town was doomed to destruction, but the flames were finally subdued, after five dwelling houses had been consumed. The house of Mrs. Bush was insured for \$1,500. The entire loss will aggregate \$5,000. Cause of fire not stated.
