THAT OUTRAGE.—The examination of the rape case, concerning which some particular appeared in yesterday's News, was to have taken place to-day, but had to be delayed on account of the illness of one of the victims of the diabolical outrage.

She was found by her brother yesterday in room over Conolly's saloon, Kimball Block, the young man sent for Dr. Ormsby, who stated that she had been severely drugged. Her present condition of prostration is doubtless the result of the drugging and the brutal treatment she received, it appears from what we could learn, that she was employed by a hair dresser on the corner of East Temple and Second.

South streets, and that her brother had the habit of calling there on evenings and talking her home. On Tuesday he intended taking her to a concert in the Twelfth Ward, but was rather late than usual, in calling on her. When he did call, he found the establishment looked up. He got there, in the 20th Ward, he had not arrived. He did not, however, suspect the young woman had gone, but that his sister in the Twelfth Ward. Next morning, Tuesday, he went to his sister's in the Twelfth Ward.

The sister had not been there. The young man then became filled with anxiety of mind, and immediately commenced a search for her in town. The hair dresser alluded to stated that he had seen her, but informed the brother of something he said he had about her being enticed to Cameron's office and of the hair dresser adding that he had seen her, which was confirmed during Wednesday morning. Nothing could be gleaned from Cameron about the missing girl.

One contemplanter fellow offered to find Mr. Lyon, the young woman's brother, who was in the city, and would receive twenty dollars for the information. She was finally traced to an apartment over Conolly's store, Kimball Block, although the proprietor of the place denied any knowledge of her presence, and at first denied Mr. Lyon an office address and entrance into the room. When admittance was finally gained the young woman was found in bed, apparently ill from being under the influence of some powerful drug. Those who had conveyed her to the room alluded to claimed that they were prompted to do so by motives of benevolence, and vouchsafed an account of her under circumstances before described, in Cameron's office. The owners of the apartment were unwilling that she be removed, and called in Dr. Fenton to prove that her removal would be dangerous to her life. Dr. Ormsby, however, who was called in by the brother, stated that she could be removed without particular danger, and a hack was procured and she was taken to her brother's residence in the 20th Ward. The case is one of unmitigated atrocity, so far as it now appears, and it is to be hoped that every person who has taken any part in the commission of the brutal crime will be met rigidly dealt with.

BOUND OVER.—Yesterday evening Eugene Farr was arraigned before Justice Clinton on a charge of stealing a horse and buggy from Mr. Mark McKinnin's, livery stable keeper, of this city. The evidence shows that Farr hired the buggy for the purpose of going to Camp Douglas.

FOREIGN NOTES.

Over a thousand young American girls are at school in France and Italy.

Prince Arthur contradicts the rumor of his engagement to write a series of magazine articles on army life.

The Prince de Joinville suggests to crown the new Vendome column with the simple statue of a French soldier.

There would then be no need of toppling it over the victory for years.

Miss Kate Field writes the American Register that rather than accept a "home on the rolling deep," she would go out as governess in an English family, which is the worst fate she can imagine falling to the lot of women.

A French musical journal announces a series of articles which are to take the form of a book, which will describe the life of a woman in America, of M. Paulus, leader of the French band.

"Photoglyphic" is the name of a discovery by a Mr. Woodbury, a chemist of London, which it is supposed will place the piece of photography.

The process is the same as that of gelatin used upon the plate that takes the picture.

A special correspondent of the World writes that he has been in Paris a week writing an eye-witness report on the three-quarters of the time, people are waiting to be overwhelmed by some one or somebody. He finds nothing astonishing and very little to go into raptures about.

Rome has increased greatly in population since it became the capital of Italy, and the demand for houses is so great that it is impossible to keep pace with the demand.

Not a single day has passed since the discovery of many rare objects of art—the debris of the ancient city.

For 1870, which have just been published, it appears that during the year the deaths of 18 men and of 63 women, whose ages were stated to be upwards of 100 years, were registered; in all, 81 persons, against 68 in 1871.

The highest ages said to have been attained in 1870 were 108, by a man who died at St. Louis, in Staffordshire, and 107, by a woman who died at Huddersfield.

There was no exaggeration in the remark made by a London magistrate the other day "that there seemed at present to be a man among women for committing suicide." Every day there are a number of cases of attempted suicide, and a number of actual suicides in this city.

On a single day last week there were six such attempts, of which three were successful.

"The Management of the Royal Drama" in Berlin is indignant at an announcement which we learn from the German papers, in which all the dignity and authority of official power, it is said, was taken to the authorities declining to come before Berlin, whereupon these gentlemen declare "that they regret to announce the King's Chamberlain, Herr von Luedow, has broken his contract with the management of the opera house, and is now six shillings for each opera."

The multiplication of railways in the East seems destined not only to spread the blessings of civilization, but the curse of semi-barbarism.
