Injustice to Jews.

By astles to Jews. Sr. PETERSBURG, 24.—The regu-lations agreed upon by the commit-tee of ministers, and approved by the Emperor, provide that henceforth Jews shall be prohibited from settl-ing outside of towns and villages, except where Jewish settlements already exist. Jews are also pro-hibited from trading on Sunday and Christian holidays. These regula-tions only apply to governments where Jews are permanently set-tled. All contracts of purchase or tenancy with Jews are provisionally be administered for the people's benefit, with efficiency, sconomy, and integrity; we demand instead of the insolence, the proscription and tyranny of bossism and machin-ism, the free and conscientious exertenancy with Jews are provisionally suspended.
