



Judge Morse Begins Consideration Of Ballots Challenged By Attorneys.

FAME OF LORIN FARR IN FRANCE

Ogden, Utah, March 3 .- In the judgeship contest case yesterday the passing judgment upon and recounting of the challenged ballots was begun by Judge Morse, and considerable progress made. The result thus far is favorable to Judge Rolapp by a net gain of 14 votes. The ballots of 17 outside districts of Weber county were gone over These, according to the original count, cast a total of 2,068 votes for district judge. Of these, 1,005 were for Howell judge. Of these, 1,005 were for Howell and 983 for Rolapp, according to the eavaasing board's report. The recount, including the recount of challenged bal-bits, showed a total vote on the judge-ship of 1.978-90 votes being rejected. Of this total number recounted, 1,048 are passed on by Judge Morse as for How-ell and 930 for Rolapp. According to the original count, How-ells majority in these districts was 142. In the recount the majority is cut down to 118. Of the 90 ballots thrown out, Howell lost 57 and Rolapp 33. The districts recounted are Hooper No. 1, Moorer No. 2, Burch Creek, Eden Farr West, Harrisville, Liberty, Kanes-wile, Harrisville, Pleasant View, Plain City No. 1, North Ogden, Marriott, Randall, Roy, Riverdale and Slater-

All the ballots rejected were rejected because of defective markings. No bal-lots were thrown out because of blots or ink splotches, but where the cross or ink splotches, but where the troats made was not in the place provided by law, or where the mark made by the voter was other than a cross or had any superfluous lines it was rejected. The judge handled each ballot again. The judge handled each ballot again, opening the packages of challenged bal-lots and passing the ballot first to the attorney representing the side which had challenged the ballot. If this side dedded to press the challenge it was then passed to the opposing attorneys, and if they still objected the judge ren-dered his decision without giving rea-sons and without hearing arguments on aw points or anything excent sugges-
