

## BOARD OF EQUALIZATION.

One Hundred and Ten Protestants  
Held on Saturday Night.

CLOTHES FANCY FIGURES EXCES-  
SIVE.

Will Over-Burdened Taxpayers Obtrude  
Any Relief?

One hundred and ten taxpayers filed  
protests for the consideration of the  
Board of Equalization Saturday night.

Li. Hall of San Francisco complained  
that his taxes had been unreasonably  
increased nearly 25 per cent. since last  
year.

S. D. Cody said his property was  
only worth \$300, but it was assessed  
at \$1,000.

Mrs. P. H. Hopkins complained of  
sickness, poverty and old age and  
asked for a remission.

Mrs. L. Cody, a widow, asked for a  
remission.

Chas. Caldwell will seek a reduction in  
the assessed valuation of his property.

M. H. Thompson, citizen.

John Cushing, seventy-six years old,  
with a widowed daughter and three  
grandchildren to support, asked for a  
remission.

Mrs. L. Kelsey expressed her dissatis-  
faction with excessive valuation.

Mrs. J. Olson, an infant widow  
with only a scant income, asked that  
she be relieved from paying taxes.

John County went in the following  
order which speaks in no uncertain  
terms:

To the Board of Equalization:

Gentlemen—I have already sent in a  
protest against my assessment, but I am  
not pleased with my property. It has been  
assessed to value at least twice its  
true value. No one in this country  
would say we live on Franklin  
avenue, the vicinity in which it lies.  
I am asking you to consider my case  
again, that the right of all should  
exist, and no neighborhood should  
have these rights.

I am sending you my assessment by  
means of hand enclosed. Under any  
circumstances the assessment is too high.  
The tax collector may take care of it  
but I do not know if the property  
is at any such rate.

R. E. Neader complained of exces-  
sive valuation.

W. H. Johnson and Brother repre-  
sented their property was assessed  
by the county at \$1,000, but Chas'les' been  
reduced to \$600.

C. G. Wilkinson filed a protest  
against his taxes as his property  
assessed at least 25 per cent. more  
than it was worth.

François Bitterfeld, another widow  
with a large family and no income,  
asked for a remission.

Mrs. M. C. Kimball, a widow, asked  
for a remission.

George Hines and John O. Smith  
submitted their property was assessed  
on their personal property.

The Commercial Insurance com-  
pany was assessed last year at \$10,000  
while it was only worth \$10,000.

Alvin Grigsby complained of  
excessive valuation.

Mrs. M. L. Lovre said her property was  
assessed entirely too high.

Mrs. A. C. Kimball, a widow, asked a  
remission.

Mrs. A. A. Hodges asked a reduction  
in her assessment.

Treasor. J. W. Walker will own  
property in Social Hall Alley, pro-  
tested against what he considered ex-  
cessive valuation both on behalf of  
himself and his wife.

They had no real improvements,  
but their taxes were enormous  
all the same.

John Dodge had in a written  
statement, in which he said he intended  
to register a kick against Clark's ex-  
cessive valuation of his property. He  
closed his protest thus: "Gentlemen,  
the increased rates are to continue  
next year, where are we going to get  
off?"

Abe Pendleton complained of ex-  
cessive valuation.

Mrs. J. Jensen filed a similar ob-  
jection.

Lulu Shaw said his property was  
assessed for more than it was worth.

Mr. C. C. Kimball complained that  
his property was assessed \$1750 more  
than it was worth.

H. F. Pendleton stated again for a  
reduction in assessment on the grounds  
that there was no improvement.

C. C. Kimball complained that his  
property was assessed entirely too high.
