Frank Hunt Run Over by Freight Train at Montelo, Nevada.

Ogden, Sept. 26 .- Frank Hunt, 18 years of age, died at the Ogden general hospital this morning as a result of injuries received about 4 o'clock this morning at Montelo, Nev. Hunt was employed as car inspector at that polat and was boarding a caboose attached to a moving freight train to test the air brakes. In some way he lost his footing and fell beneath the wheels. Both of his arms were severed.

A special train was immediately sent to Ogden, conveying the injured youth, and upon arrival here he was taken to the hospital, but died a short time af-
