### CHARTER REVOKED.

#### Lehi Wing of Socialist Party Excommunicated-Fusion Cause.

What is known as the state quorum of the Socialist party held a meeting last night at their headquarters, 68 south East Temple street, at which the charter of the Lehi local was re-voked and seven members thereof were expelled. This action was taken because of a fusion agreement between the Socialists and Democrats, whereby the Socialists agreed to indorse John Snow, the Democratic nominee for mayor, and the Democrats reciprocated by placing a number of So-cialists on their ticket. This action, it seems, was in direct violation of the party platform, hence the step taken by the state quorum. The resolution

by the state quorum. The resolution passed last night is as follows: "That, whereas, W. S. Evans, Edson Whipple, John Whipple, Henry East, Mr. Sims, Robert Glichrist and F. Wil-cox, all heretofore members of the Socialist party at Lebi, Utah, have in-dorsed a political candidate who is not a member of the Socialist party; and and

'Whereas, Said action is in violation "Whereas, Said action is in violation of the National and State constitution, which reads as follows: "Resolved, That no state or local organization, or member of the party shall, under any circumstances, fuse, combine or com-promise with any pelitical party or organization, or refrain from making nominations in order to further the in-terests of candidates of such parties or organizations; and,

terests of candidates of such parties or organizations; and, "Whereas, Said parties by their ac-tions expelled themselves from the So-cialist party; therefore, be it "Resolved, That said parties as nom-inees for political office not being mem-bers of the Socialist party, have no right to use the name Socialist on any municipal ballot and the said members stand expelled from the Socialist party; and, be it further and, be it further "Resolved, Pursuant to the violation

of the above clause in the national con-stitution, that the charter of the Lehi local is hereby revoked and declared null and void."

The authority of the state quorum for taking the above action is found in section 3 of article 13, of the constitu-tion, which is as follows: "Any mem-ber advocating fusion or indorsement of or by any other party, shall at once stand expelled by his own action."
