DALY JUDGE STATIONARY.

Totals for Forenoon Business Hug Ten
Thousand Mark—Utahs are Fa-
vorites at Fair Figures.

Mountain Lake was the heavy seller in the local mining stock exchange this morning and during regular call trading centered upon it, last 2 cents; gaining one again on 75, seller 30, opened the doings, followed by the transfer of 600 at a cent less. A block comprising 1,000 shares followed at 73, 2 cents less. (This sale was made with seller 30). A block of 200 went at 73 and the closing sale involved 300 at 72, seller 30. Lower Mammoth opened the regular call at \$1.35. One thousand shares went at this figure. Seven Troughs opened at 74, climbed a cent and then dropped 2, closing at 73. One hundred Dalry Judge sold at 72.50. On the open board Mountain Lake opened at 73 and closed for the forenoon at 74, 100 going at the first figure and 600 at the second. EXPECTS BIG THINGS.

The Revenue Mining company is installing a compressor plant at its property in the Pine Grove district, 13 miles west of Newhouse in Beaver county. It will run eight drills and will be ready for service by the last of the month. All that is to be installed now is a big fly-wheel which is now being hauled from Newhouse to the Revenue. John Thompson, the well known machinist, has been selected to Revere's machinery and that of the Utah-New York company at Milford also. Mr. Thompson is in this city while the Revenue's fly-wheel is being hauled. He says numerous leads show gold, silver and copper values, and wherever work has been carried on good ore has been found. The company has 100 patented claims.

LETS HAULING CONTRACT.

The Colorado Mining company let a contract to J. E. Daniels of Provo Monday to hauling all its ore and supplies between a mine and the city station. Mr. Daniels was in the city yesterday arranging to start work before the end of the present week and within a day or so the teaming road will be completed. Daily shipments will consist of one car at first, although this may be increased later. Some shipments have been made since the Colorado but no contract has been let before. The Colorado is one of the youngest mines in the Platte district.

ROAD NOW BUILT.

The Nevada Hills company has been handicapped by lack of hauling facilities and the announcement is made by the Goldfield that the road to the mine has been completed. The completion of the road means the resumption of shipping. There is over 12 cars of ore at the mine. This will be shipped to local smelters and more will follow as the mine is far enough ahead to assure steady shipping when it was started. As soon as the various stores in the mine are rid of the ore which has accumulated in them the working force will be increased. The Nevada Hills is going to do things a big scale as soon as it gets above ground. This is one of the few mines which have so much ore it gets in the way. Rapid roadway is being made on the Nevada Hills. The depth of the mine is attained the values increase. An assay was recently taken and the average returns showed 277 in the white and yellow metals. This ore requires no sorting and is sacked and made ready for shipment as soon as hoisted. The management announces its intention of shipping work and arrangements are now being made to commence this work. The shaft will be a three-compartment affair and it will be sure to a great extent. Machinery is to be ordered at once and when the new equipment is installed the Nevada Hills will have one of the swiftest plants in the state.

GOOD ORE IN CITY ROCKS.

The City Rocks at Alta, which has been following a new fissure, made an unexpected find of ore a few days ago. The work in the City Rocks is now workings between stations No. 9 and 10 has cut a two foot vein, containing a 10-inch streak which carries over 500 of silver. \$3.20 in gold and 15.3 per cent copper. The balance of the vein is worth about \$20 a ton in the three metals. The company has no idea yet as to the size of the body of ore just opened but the strike has brought attention to a lot of virgin ground with excellent showings. A man connects the two veins and the main tunnel about 200 feet below and this is to be enlarged and a chute installed. Ore found in the upper workings will be dumped into the chute and thus brought out to surface without needless work or loss of time.

YOUNGEST OF ALL

New Town Springing up in John-
nie District Near Clark
Road.

NEVADA'S PROMISING INFANT.

Salt Lickers, True to Reputation, Get
In Among the First to Get
Good Ground.

(Special to the "News")

Indian Springs, April 24.—Sterling is Nevada's latest mining camp. It gives promise of being not only a producer of ore but the showing made so far in its ores is very gratifying and denotes that the particular portion of Nevada will develop some of the best mines in the state. Sterling, as a town will prove a success as it has no rival within a radius of many miles and the town itself is being built upon one of the prettiest spots imaginable and has a splendid water right. The place was not dreamed of until early in March, 1907, but so soon had the town been surveyed that new roads were made. The mining world of the good looking ore coming from that section and the rush began, the crowd going in via the Salt Lake Route and the Las Vegas & Tonopah, to Indian Springs. A siding will be built at or near Mile Post 55 on the last named road, which will make Sterling a handy forward.

HAS BEEN PROSPECTED.

It is in the Johnnie mining district, Nye county, Nevada, and the district itself is not entirely new as some prospectors have worked the country to a slight extent some years ago. Recently G. H. Hendrich passed through the region and saw some good-looking rock assays and further investigation proved the worth of the ground and after very carefully going over the region he located some promising claims which he has taken title to. His holdings in the district are large.

SALT LICKERS GET IN.

Other prospectors who have original claims in the district are Harry L. Stratton, Joe Wosinek, P. R. Murphy, J. C. Woods and J. H. Hendrich. A portion of the locations of Hendrich consisted of the Copper Mountain property. Here, at an elevation of 5,500 feet, Hendrich has located a number of splendid copper ore. The ledge runs straight down the mountain ridge 90 feet long and an average width of 50 feet. The ledge is a fine example of copper. The ore taken from various points in this claim shows high copper values, one assay showing 10 per cent and an average on many different samples going as high as 20 per cent. The whole property was taken on an option from Mr. Hendrich by the Tonopah syndicate consisting of J. H. Hendrich, J. H. Riley, J. J. McQuillan, J. J. Mullin and W. H. Shackley. A syndicate composed of Los Angeles and Salt Lake capitalists has gone into the region and secured many claims.

GOLD ALSO FOUND.

Gold has been found in several of the mines located and Sterling Mountain samples from Harry Stratton's mine, J. C. Woods' mine and Hendrich's group of claims and adjacent to Copper Mountain, Murphy & Wood's Atlas group, Westfall's September mine and others have for the last few weeks attracted great attention in Los Angeles, Denver and Salt Lake where they have been shown. The country is well covered by Hendrich's group of claims and in the meantime against distant necessities. No great change is expected until the new clip be sent to assay. The market is maintaining a steady price.

GOOD TOWNSITE.

The townsite lies on a flat and has just enough slope to give proper drainage. A postoffice will be established at every way the aim be to make it a prosperous town in keeping with the importance of the location and to care for the immense rush to the region owing to the many splendid finds there. To the lover of the beautiful, presents picture of a town duplicated in one of the other spots, the Grand Canyon, Colorado in Arizona. Looking toward the north from the townsite one can almost imagine the truth in the same region. The smoke is not a smoke, but a steam, which has penetrated this trackless and unknown country. HAS SMOKE CONSUMER.

Mammoth Men May Make Millions If
His Invention is Success.

George Morby, who for the past several years has been in the employ of the Mammoth Mining company, has made application for an apparatus designed to purify smelter smoke, says the Mammoth Record. For years past smelter fumes have been a source of serious loss, both to the farmers and in the escape of valuable metals in vapor. It is the object of Morby's device to precipitate the sulphurous gases by means of ingeniously introducing a spray of water through which the smoke passes before entering the stack. If the claims of Morby prove to be all he anticipates it will be a valuable thing for the smelters.

PRICES DECLINE
LIGHT BUSINESS

Stocks That Have Been Most
Prominent in Recent Markets
Showed Widest Changes.

U. P. WAS UNDER PRESSURE.

So Were Reading and Amalgamated—
Trading Quite Featureless—
Bonds Were Firm.

New York, April 24.—Prices of stocks moved irregularly in the opening dealings, but the majority of important issues showed declines. The changes were widest in the stocks that have been prominent in all the recent markets. Missouri Pacific and Reading lost a point and Northern Pacific, Atchafalaya, Amalgamated Copper and Smeltering large fractions. The volume of business was very meager.

A renewal of selling orders drove the market quite generally to a good fraction beyond yesterday's closing. The most determined pressure centered against Union Pacific, Reading and Amalgamated. The tone became firmer but dealings were small and fluctuations hesitating. Bonds were firm.

Reading achieved some prominence when it rose to a point beyond yesterday's closing, touching 12 1/2. The rest of the list, while better, continued to be largely neglected. Smeltering and Union Pacific were bought freely after the demand for Reading waned. Smeltering was bid up to 100, and Union Pacific and Union Pacific got back to 14 1/2, its high price of the morning. Otherwise the list was featureless.
