## A. B. Nielsen's Indignation.

The preliminary examination of A. B. Nielsen, on the charge of embezzling \$750, preferred by Isaac Vogt, was commenced at 11 o'clock yesterday morning, and will continue until noon today. In the absence of a witness wanted by the prosecution the case was postponed until 8 o'clock, at which time the defendant waived examination, and was held in the grand jury on a bond of \$1,000. The trial date is set for October 1st.

Judge Leonard and Col. Hayes adjourned immediately to their client being committed to the custody of a United States marshal instead of the sheriff of the county.

While the discussion of this question was pending, Mr. Nielsen, after committing me to a United States marshal, was prostrated. This ruling was made for the Mormons whom convicted of unlawful cohabitation, that they be taken over the hands of their local authorities in this other country. It's absurd.

Commissioner Hukuhara ruled all had been tried, and the defendant was committed to the custody of Marshal Finch. Last night in default of bail, Nielsen was taken to the penitentiary.

Judge Leonard gave notice that the ruling would be tested, probably by a habeas corpus proceeding.

## Firth District Court.

The Fourth district court held a short session yesterday.

The suit of John G. Higgins and others against Ogden city, paying too paving contractors on Twenty-third street out of the fund of the corporation, was continued. A judgment was rendered in favor of the city, and the question submitted to the Honor, Judge Miner, who will name down a decision later.

In the case of Thomas G. Axson vs. the Colorado & Utah Railroad company, it was made evident yesterday that the railroad will file an answer very soon to the original affidavit for attachment.

Diverse proceedings were commenced by Uncle Amos against his son-in-law, Harry L. Ammons, and his son, the result of which will depend on the outcome, unless he provides and healthful arrangement—a trio of wife. The wife asks for the custody of her three small children and financial aid.

## Court.

The county court met in regular session yesterday.

A resolution was adopted that Mr. Morgan should get a more extensive trial on the matter of embezzling \$750, of the money from the summit of the mountain—which is the dividing line between the two counties—in Pocatello station in Morgan county, and thus a means of travel communication would be opened up to the citizens of both counties. Weber county has already completed its part of the road.

Each Ballantyne said that he is allowed to make an application in here certain about his case referred to county Attorney Weimer.

## Probate Court.

In the matter of the estate of Jess Peter Nielsen, deceased, James Iverson, the administrator, answered the claim and appeared and filed his final accounting.

A hearing was had on the final account in the matter of the estate of Daniel Gamble, deceased, and an order was made approving the same and discharging the administrator.

## The Reform School.

The board of directors of the Reform school met yesterday in regular monthly session. Three inmates were publicly suspended from the school, namely, William O'Conor of Salt Lake, Roy Pratt from the same place and Katie Miser of Park city.

Justice Wittewill filed an application for a position as teacher.

A cut in the wages of the employee was voted, and several other matters attended to.

The board then adjourned till Sept. 20th.

## Held To Answer.

Fred Moody, the young fellow charged with burglarizing the news stand at the depot, was held to the grand jury in bonds of \$200 by Commissioner Ogden yesterday.

## Offenders Against the Law.

Justice Carlson will have before him this morning Samuel Austin charged by Chief Hinford with

misdemeanor in slandering his son in a false claim to the fire department.

Wm. Tournier and James Welch were joined in yesterday on the charge of vagrancy. Whitney Smith, for having ten men house and getting into trouble generally, while Hayes, for vagrancy was gathered in "on general principles."
