I arrived in this city on Saturday evening, 18th inst., at 6 o'clock, in good health and spirits, having left San Francisco, Cal., on the 20th of June, br. Nalles, San Jose Mission, on the 26th June, Dr. McIntire's, near Sacramento City, on the 2d July, and Col. Reese's Mill, Carson Valley, on the 18th July.

Our company (including some packers who joined us on Mary's River) consisted of 16 men, 2 women, 6 wagons, and 29 horses and mules.

M. S. Hadley, A. Thompson, and C. Dodge, for U. S. A. We had good luck by the way-good grass and water. Met many companies from Utah and the States. Saw several hundred Indians on the waters of Mary's river, -from whom we had a supply of salmon trout-all very friendly.

We were all weary with our journey and pligrimage, and thankful to get home; and the joy of meeting with our friends and families was more than we shall attempt to describe.

I had been absent upwards of 15 months, during which I had promulgated the gospel, on the Pacific, with all the energy and gift that God saw fit to bestow upon me, and with some degree of success.

LITTLE BLUE, July 5, 1855.

ELDER G. A. SMITH:-

Dear Brother:- I write to inform you that Elder Jacob P. Secrist died of the cholera on the 2nd of this month, about twenty miles east of Little Blue. He was taken sick while away from the company hunting horses near the Minehaw, and was left at the Vermillion.

The cholera appeared to have left him, but he com- ry and reference. plained of fever in his bowels. We washed and anointed him, and laid our hands upon him in the name of the immediate attention .- By order of the presidents, Lord.

During the day he continued about the same, and through the night. The next morning, while traveling he got worse; we stopped his wagon on the prairie; brother O. M. Duel and myself, with two others, stayed with him until he died, which was at 1 o'clock, p.m.

The elders who were with the company concluded to bring his remains to the Valley with them, if a tin coffin could be obtained. We obtained tin from br. Jackman, in charge of Williams' train, and br. Stevenson made the coffin.

After consulting together, we came to the conclusion that the tin was not sufficiently strong to answer the purpose, so we burled his body on the banks of the Little Blue, where the road first comes close to the bank of the river.

We afterwards had a council composed of N. T. Guyman, E. G. M. Hogan, O. M. Duel, Peter Hanson, and myself. Noah T. Guyman was appointed captain of the company, O. M. Duel was appointed to the charge of br. Secrist's effects.

Yours respectfully in the gospel of Christ. P.S .- We are getting along tolerably well; the cholera has been amongst us, but generally light and but few deaths.


