Produces Documentary Evidence With Which He Hopes to Confound Dowie.

LETTER SENT TO ELIJAH.

Warned Him to Change His Ways or ▲ Clash Was Inevit-

Chicago, April 15 .- General Overseer Voliva produced the first of his batch of documentary evidence today by which he hopes to cofound John Alexander Dowle and his followers, The instrument was a letter written under date of April 13, 1904, and addressed to Dowle, who was then in Zurich, Switzerland. The letter was signed by Overseer John G. Speicher, Charles J. Bernard and Judge V. V. Barnes. In the document they warned Dowie that unless he changed his ways in the management of Zion City a clash was inevitable.

They stated that from their examination of the conduct of affairs of the colony it was evident that Dowie had overdrawn his account at the bank everdrawn his account at the bank of Zion City; that he received deposits when it was known that the bank was insolvent; that he had used funds otherwise than in accordance with the representations made by the stock con-tracts and certaificates; that the proof of the appropriation of such large sums for his own personal use and for ends outside of the industries named would be tantamount to a conviction would be tantamount to a conviction of embezzlement in any court of law. The letter further inplored Dowie to exercise a rigid economy on the part of himself and his family, saying that expenditures to this end should be based on needs rather than upon a fletitious income.

fletitious income. The inhabitants of Zion Gity, antici-pating that such a letter would be read, flocked to the tabernacle early, and long before the services opened the big building was filled. After the regular Easter ceremony the sensation was sprung when General Overseer Voliva requested that Overseer Brazefield read the letter. When Deacon Brazeld read that section which said here is no doubt for a moment that a failure to meet payments and an exposure of the true condition of things would land yourself and cashier and general financial manager in fail very promptly," the audience signified is approval of the sentiment expressed vigorous applause. timued: "The standard of Zion cannot be lower than that set by the business world outside. Your safest place will be here at home. There is but one country outside, and that is Chill, where you would be safe from the at-tacks that would be made, and the situation here would be hazardous if you continue your policy.
