SENATE. Petition against Income Tax.—The Currency Question Discussed.

Burnham presented a petition from the merchants of Cleveland against the continuance of the income tax.

Fenton spoke against any expansion of the currency and in favor of an early return to specie payments.

Bills Regulating Public Lands, &c.

Julian, from the Committee on Public Lands, reported a bill providing that no title shall be acquired to any agricultural or public lands in the State of California, not heretofore disposed of, except by settlement under the homestead or pre-emption laws.

Wheeler introduced a bill authorizing the Northern Pacific Railroad to issue bonds and to secure the same by mortgage; referred.

After some unimportant business the House resumed the consideration of the League Island Navy Yard bill.

Travis introduced a bill to amend the act passed yesterday for the admission of Virginia, providing that the word "oath," wherever it need be construed, shall include affirmation.

WASHINGTON.
