PAY OF OFFICERS.

House and Senate Conferees Agree or Bill Raising It.

Washington, April 29 .- The senate

and house conferees on the army bill and house conferees on the army old reached an agreement tonight. The senate conferees receded from the amendment raising the pay of officers on a percentage basis. Instead, a schedule was adopted increasing the pay of major generals, brighdler gen-erals, colonels, lieutenant-colonels, majors and first lieutenants \$500 per majors and first lieutenants \$500 per anaum; captains \$600; second lieuten-ants, \$200; and cadets \$100. On this schedule, the salary of major generals will be \$5,000 per annum; brigadier generals, \$6,000; colonels, \$4,000; lieu-tenant colonels, \$3,500; majors, \$3-000; captains, \$2,400; first lieutenants \$2,000; second lieutenants, \$1,700, and cndets, \$600. The conference agreement also pro-

The conference agreement also pro-vides that the go ernment shall furn-ish remounts and horse equipments for officers below the rank of major, required to be mounted, or if an of-ficer provides his own mount, he shall receive \$150 per annum for one horse and \$200 for two horses. The con-ferees adopted the senate amendment

shall be no bonus for re-enlistment. The senate amendment providing \$1,000,000 for field maneuvers and summer encampments was retained. The appropriation for officers' quart-ers was reduced \$500,000. Besides the above principal' points at issue be-tween the two houses, many minor differences were adjusted and a com-plete agreement was reached.

In a test sult arranged between attorneys for the covering teach for the Colory the governme thand for the Colora-Cattle and Horse Growers' associado Cattle and Horse Growers' associa-tion the government sought an injunc-tion to restrain Fred Light, a cattle-man, living near Aspen, Colo., from permitting his cattle to go upon the Holy Cross forest reserve, although the land is unfenced. By agreement the de-fendant did not answer the complaint but filed a demurrer, denying that the government has any legal right to pre-vent him from turning his cattle out to graze under the common law and police law of the state. The demurrer was overruled by Judge Lewis. Attorneys for the stock interests will carry the case to the supreme court of the United States.

The royal mourning for the late Carlos and his son was suspended for the occasion. The entirgarrison of Lisbon was turned out at daylight and formed along the route from the palace to the parliament

from the palace to the parliament buildings. While journeying to and from the buildings of parliament. King Manuel was respectfully greet-cd by the people. King Manuel proceeded to the cortes accompanied by many dignitaries of the state and escorted by a strong guard of troops. The floor of the chamber was filled with deputies and nears: while the galleries were crowd-

chamber was filled with deputies and peers, while the galleries were crowd-ed with a brilliant audience. His majesty slowly mounted the tribune that had been especially erected for his use. His address, which he read in strong and full tones, not unlike those of his father, was a pathetic and at the same time a practical and vigorous discourse, cal-culated to win the sympathy of the people. He touched upon the trag-edy of Feb. 1, when his father and his brother were shot down, as "the cruel disappearance of my father and brother."
