### PROVO BANKERS IN LINE.

Will Protect Deposits by Issuing Credit Certificates.

Provo, Nov. 1.—As a matter of self-protection, the bankers of our city held a meeting at the Grand Central rooms, deciding to follow the resolution adopted by the Salt Lake clearing house. All checks will be honored and instead of getting cash for them, credit certificates will be given. They decided to pay cash on checks to each individual to the amount of \$50 twice a week. The checks of all depositors will be honored in business transactions, and their credit will remain intact. The certificates will be accepted at par the same as gold by every bank in this city as well as other cities. Because of the refusal of eastern banks to ship money west, this step became necessary.
