Washington, Nov. 27.—It is improba-ble that any legislation looking to the exclusion of Japanese will receive the approval of the executive until an op-portunity has been had to test the ef-ficiency of the new regulations that the Japanese government is preparing with a view to regulating emigration. Goblin Finished Last in Race But May Win Cup.

IS NOW THE CARD.

Baltimore, Nov. 27.-Secy. of the In-terior Garfield, speaking of irrigation, said in an interview today: "This work has advanced far enough to demonstrate absolutely fits success. We have seen fruits, vegetables, grain and everything else growing on lands where nothing but cartus ever grew before the day of irrigation. "There are 2,000,000 acres of these arid lands all told. We have com-pleted the irrigation work on 1,000,000 acres.

pletad the frrigation work on 1,000,000 acres. "As soon as they get the water they are as fertile as any soil. "So far we have worked chiefly on the public lands, although adjacent private property will benefit. This land is turned over to actilers under a home-stead act, although the old 100-acre al-lotment is not adhered to. The slab of the lot is determined by its fertility, 20 or 40 acres in most cases. "The settlers take these lots with the understanding that they are to pay back to the government the cost of the irrigation improvements in 10 annual installments, beginning as soon as the water is turned on. They also have to pay the cost of maintenance, which this arrangement the infoney advanced by the government will all be returned to it, and can be pay out again in other territories until all the arid lands have been made fertile."
