Railroads in Montana Are-Now Saving Shippers There Six Cents Per 100 Pounds. From Utah and Idaho the story of the 1908 wool market is written almost com-

pletely, but from Montana there are pletely, but from Montana there are still new developments. A new conces-sion from the milroad is saving the shippers there 6 cents per 100 pounds, and causing the shipment of a great deal of wool from small points, instead of having it bulked at certain big cen-ters. Heretofore the shipper has had to bale his wool before the railroads would accept it. Now they may sack the product, and the result is more convenience to the growers. "For the first time in the history of the woolgrowing industry in Mon-

"For the first time in the history of the woolgrowing industry in Mon-tana," says the Butte Intermountum in commenting on the situation, "wooi is being shipped generally without first being baled, and the sheepman is spared the extra expense of 6 cents for the bailing of each 100 pounds. This is the most important change in regard to wool shipping that has tak-on place in Montana in years, and it has materially lessened the amount of wool formerly handled at the large shipping points.

shipping points. "Heretofore the woolshipper has had

to take his wool to one of the large warehouses and have it baled before it would be accepted for shipment. The buyer, too, was often put to inconveni-ence, for the baling machines were

buyer, too, was often put to inconveni-ence, for the balling machines were kept so buzy that some of the lot owners were oftentimes compelled to wait for days before their wool was reached by the bailing crew. "The acceptance of wool in sacks by the raflroad changes this. It loads about one-third less to the car, and the rate on it is 5 cents a hundred more, but this is borne by the wool-buyer. To the grower the change brings a saving in time and money, and does away in many instances with longer hauls to the warehouses. Under the new order of things the day of the baller is past and the Mon-tana woolgrower no longer has to ship his wool to some local initial point to be bald before it can be accepted for shipment to the eastern markets. It means that the initial wool points will see less of the woolgrower than form-erly, for in years past the baling crews have often worked day and night long after the last sale of the season be-fore the initial point warehouses were cleaned out. "Reports from the different wool-

after the last sale of the season be-fore the initial point warehouses were cleaned out. "Reports from the different wool-shipping centers of the state indicate that the wool shipped from Montana this year will be in the neighborhood of 30.000,000 pounds, or about 3.000,000 pounds less than it was last year. In-dications also are that while the gen-eral price is lower than it was last year, there is not a great deal of difference. Woolmen say that much of the buying throughout the state has been on ad-vance contract and that the open mar-ket deals this year have been fewer than they were last year. "The doing away with the baling will make the total pounds handled at the initial warehouses smaller than ever before in the history of the state, so woolbuyers and growers and rail-road men declare."

## Attorney General Answers Query on The Subject from Emery County.

The attorney-general answers as follows, an inquiry from the clerk of Emery county on a new registration his fall:

I have your favor of the 10th inst., in which you submit for my official opinion the following: "Will it be necessary for a complete new registra-tion this fall?"

In reply, I beg to direct your atten-tion to section 816, Compiled Laws of 1907, which, in so far as material here, reads as follows:

Hot, which, in so far as material here, reads as follows: "County clerk to prepare register of voters, Prior to the time of register-ing voters at each general election, this county clerk, of each county of the state, shall prepare an official register of the voters of each election district of his county, by making a list in alphabetical order of all persons who voted at the last general municipal election, as shown by the checked copies of the official register used, or the poll list made, at such election, which official register shall be delivered to the registry agent of the district at least 20 days prior to the first day of registration, and shall be revised by adding the names of all persons registered on the proper days prior to election." In view of this statute, your inquiry must be answered in the negative, and you are so addied.
