The deck, some 120 feet long at its widest part, is divided into compartments by the water rollers and carries the superstructure devoted to passenger accommodation and the engine room. The entire vessel is supported by a series of rollers, resting in a similar position between the rollers and driven by a 300 horsepower engine. The rollers themselves also possess independent motion in the form of a smaller engine connected with each pair of rollers.
