PREPARING FOR FOUR STATE FAIR

Large Force of Men Erecting New Buildings, Booths, Etc., for Big Exhibition.

SERVICES AT TABERNACLE.

Funeral of Henry Tribe—Everything Ready for Building New Freight Depot—News Briefs.

OGDEN, Aug. 30.—This morning a force of 100 men was put to work at the Intermountain Fair grounds, building additional stalls for race horses and booths for exhibits; also making other improvements necessary for the big Four-State fair which opens next Monday.

There is no doubt the fair will be the largest and most successful exhibition ever held in the northern part of the state and equal to the state fair held in Salt Lake City. Northern Utah, eastern Nevada, southern Idaho and western Wyoming will be largely represented at the fair, both in exhibits and attendance. Special excursion rates have been granted by all the railroads entering in Ogden from the surrounding states.

There will be about 400 horses at the fair grounds for the races during the fair as well as the 15-day meet which begins Sept. 12. The horses include those that have been running in Montana and Nevada during the summer.

The live stock show of the fair will be the largest ever held here and will have entries from four states. Exhibit space in the merchants' and manufacturers' building is almost at a premium, in account of the large number of applications for space from the manufacturers of the four states and the merchants of Ogden.

The amusement part of the fair other than horse races, at 2:30 o'clock each afternoon will be a wild west show at 1 p. m., and 7 p. m., and a fireworks display at 9 p. m.

TABERNACLE SERVICES.

WORK ON NEW FREIGHT DEPOT

OGDEN, Aug. 30.—Within the next few days work will be commenced upon the tearing down of the Kiesel warehouse and other buildings at the corner of Twenty-fourth street and Wall avenue to make room for the new \$100,000 freight depot to be erected by the Harman lines. This is the announcement that was made in railroad circles during the past few days following the adjustment of the differences between the railroad officials and Fred J. Kiesel, who held a 50-year lease upon the property. The work will be under the direction of Assistant Engineer A. Q. Campbell.

The work upon the five additional side tracks in the railroad yards is progressing very satisfactorily. It is stated that many other improvements will follow in the railroad yards at an early date.

BOVINES AFFECTED WITH LIVER ROT

Cows Become Diseased in Vicinity of Pools of Stagnant Water.

(Special Correspondence.)

PROVO, Aug. 30.—Autopsies on cows which have died in this vicinity have been made by Drs. Spaulding and Loveless, veterinary surgeons, under the direction of Asst. City Physician E. G. Hughes. Dr. Hughes claims that the disease is liver rot. It is caused by a parasite liver fluke, which lays its eggs on blades of grass near stagnant water. The eggs germinate in the stomach and the parasite passes into the liver and causes the disease. It is not communicable to humans from the affected animal, according to Dr. Hughes.

They will probably be baseball games between the soldiers and the local teams, and other sports provided, and a reception given to the officers.

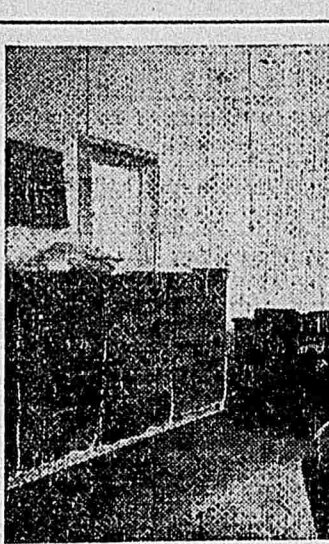
